Robert Bender Sr., Prominent Lawyer, Dies On Saturday

Attorney Robert B. Bender Sr., Westmont, died in his sleep of a heart attack at 5:30 a. m. last Saturday. He was 53 years of age. Mr. Bender was born Sept. 15, 1897, in Ebersburg, a son of Albert E. and Eleanor (Dunegan) Bender. He was graduated from St. Francis College in Loretto and received his bachelor of laws degree from Georgetown University Law School, Washington, D. C., in 1923.

The attorney practiced law in Washington before moving to Johnstown in 1927. He was admitted to the Cambria County Bar the same year. He served as solicitor of Getstown Borough continuously since 1928 and serving Legrain Borough in a similar capacity the past 10 years.

Attorney Bender was a veteran of World War I and was very active in the American Legion and Catholic War Veterans.

He is survived by his widow, the former Mercia Evans, and these children: Robert B. Jr., Johnstown; Fr. Albert E., St. Vincent's Archabbey, Latrobe; John E., Hillary and Francis, all at home. He was a brother of Ned Bender of Johnstown, Philip of St. Petersburg, Fla., Col. George of University of Mississippi and Mrs. Marie Grieff of Carrolltown.

A Solemn Requiem High Mass was sung in Our Mother of Sorrows Catholic Church, Johnstown on Tuesday at 10 a. m., and interment was made in GravView Cemetery.

State Health Dept. Opens Campaign To Cut Down Polio

The Pennsylvania Health Dept. has opened a campaign to cut down the number of polio cases as the dread disease reached its peak period of infection.

Dr. Russell E. Teague, state health secretary, said the campaign will continue until the season ends around Nov. 1.

"From now until then our main job will be to stress the preventive aspect to parents. If they'll just follow the simple rules of keeping their child from getting usagi daxz puz ponfrie-zaxo away from crowds and polluted swimming places, their chances of escaping unharmed are greatly increased," Teague said.

The secretary said the outbreak to date this year has not been as severe as in 1950. So far there have been 93 cases reported, compared to 120 for the same period last year.

"But the season is just hitting its peak," he added, "and it is hard to say just what the future will hold."

Every child who comes in contact with the polio virus may suffer a slight spell of the disease.

"But the physical condition of the children," Teague added, "in the great majority of cases is such that they may feel a little displeasure and then throw off the effects. From then on they are generally immune."

"However, in those cases where the children are over-tired or in places where they shouldn't be, then the disease takes hold and causes paralysis," the secretary added.

Permanent WAC Recruiter Located At Altoona Office

Sgt. Robert J. Snyder of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Service announced today that area girls interested in a service career are now assured of prompt consideration for service enlistment.

According to the Sergeant, Barnesboro is included in the 10 Central Pennsylvania counties now assigned to a newly appointed WAC and WAF recruiting officer, Capt. Ruth S. Reenstjerna. The captain has her headquarters in Altoona and together with her present staff of two enlisted assistants process all applications for service enlistment.

This means that North Cambria girls can now visit or call the area office and arrange for a trip to Altoona where the WAC and WAF recruiting staff will help determine her service, interest and eligibility. "There are hundreds of jobs for girls in both the WAC and WAF," Sgt. Snyder added, "and both services are expanding daily."

In the near future, Sgt. Snyder will announce when Capt. Reenstjerna or one of her assistants, Cpl. Florence Loeich of the WAC or Cpl. Phyllis Pentheny of the WAF, will visit the North Cambria area.

Attic Fan Simple Way to Cool House

The attic fan is one of the most economical methods of circulating cool air through a house. Taking advantage of the fact

that outside air after sundown is usually from 15 to 25 degrees cooler than the hot air trapped inside the house, an attic fan quickly lowers the indoor temperature. The new night-air cooling fans are efficient, quiet, inexpensive to operate, and simple to install. They run slowly to reduce vibration. A 36-inch fan, which is the typical size for the medium home, will circulate 10,000 cubic feet of air out of and into the house each minute.

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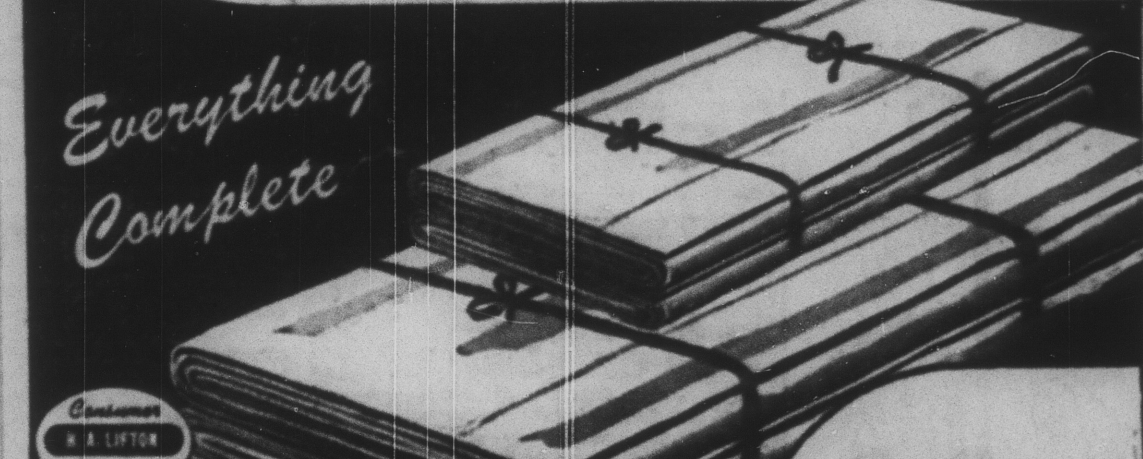


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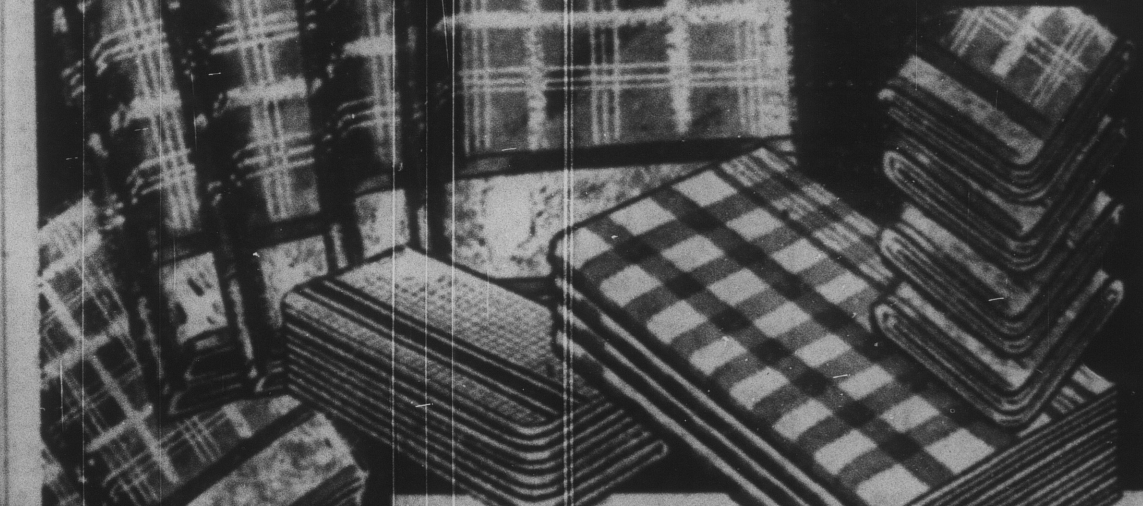


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
