

Soil Conservation Unit to Take Part in B. & O. Contest

Cambrians Asked to Report Any Oak Wilt

An invitation to take part in the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad soil conservation contest was one of a number of matters considered by the board of directors of the Cambria County Soil Conservation District at a meeting in the Commissioners' Office at Ebensburg last Thursday evening.

The B. & O. each year awards substantial cash prizes to the contestant with the most complete conservation program in operation. In order to be eligible, the contestant must be a cooperatively with a soil conservation district, residing within a county with B. & O. service.

In order to improve relations and foster a mutual understanding of each other's problems, it was agreed that the county board of the Production & Marketing Administration would be invited to take part in a joint meeting with the Soil Conservation District board.

O. L. Mulholland of the State Dept. of Forests & Waters stated that a new list of available planting stock from the department is now ready for distribution. He also stated that it is the wish of the Dept. of Forests & Waters that all persons be on the alert to detect oak wilt.

Where to Report Oak Wilt

Anyone noticing the disease is asked to report it to the District Forester, 629 Swank Bldg., Johnstown, or the Agricultural Extension Office, Courthouse, Ebensburg.

Samuel M. Fullerton, work unit conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, reported that surveys have been completed on over 6000 acres of farm land in Cambria County. Conservation farm plans have been worked out with the farm owners and operators of the most of this area.

Oscar A. Kimmel, supervisor of soil conservation districts, announced that the annual meeting of Keystone Chapter of the Soil Conservation Society of Pennsylvania will be held at Hershey on Aug. 24-25. Several board members from this county will attend. Features will be speakers of national reputation in the field of conservation.

The program also will provide a tour of the Hershey Chocolate Plant and Industrial School as well as Hershey Estate farms to observe the outstanding soil and moisture conservation program which has been in operation on the farm for about the past 10 years.
