

County Fair At Ebensburg Drawing Record Attendance

Massed Band Playing Big Attraction Tuesday

Attendance records at the 1951 Cambria County Fair likely will set a new all-time high if crowds keep on flooding the gates such as have so far this week.

To start with the opening day Labor Day drew some 47,000 persons, over 1,800 more than the opening day of last year. Tuesday and Wednesday also saw a breaking of last year's records. This record Labor Day crowd flooded every nick and corner of the fairgrounds from the livestock exhibits across to the race track. Every bit of the estimated 50 acres of parking space was filled throughout the day and well into the evening, but traffic was kept moving by borough, state and special fair police.

One of the top attractions on Labor Day was the appearance of Charlie Spivak and his orchestra, with about 3,000 persons filling the arena for both the afternoon and evening performances. Exhibit space also is all filled, and many persons attend the fair just to see the latest and most

modern products as displayed in the exhibition halls. The Frank Wirth revue, "On the Town," also is presented each evening. In addition to the team of Dietrich and Diane (with the latter being Miss Jennie Batdorf of Patton), other acts in the revue include:

The Dancing Brooks, Russell and Joy; Lela and Lita, slapshoe comedy routines; Page and Rene, spring acrobats; the Land Family, springboard artists; the DeMat-tuzias, specialty dancers, and Susan Brooks, acrobatic dancer.
