Prison Board Asks Dismissal Of Suit In Tokarchik Case

Preliminary Objections Are Filed With Court

The Cambria County Court is being asked to dismiss a damage suit filed against the Cambria County Prison Board by a woman who was attacked and injured by an unguarded prisoner in Ebnensburg last Dec. 5.

Attorney Philip N. Shettig, the county solicitor, takes the position that the county cannot be sued for damages as a result of incidents which occur in connection with governmental functions.

Attorney Shettig explained his position at a meeting of the prison board last week and at the same time filed preliminary objections asking that the suit be dismissed.

The suit against the board was filed by Mrs. Jessie Novak of Ebnensburg, who claims damages to cover medical and hospital bills and loss of earning power. She was attacked on an Ebnensburg street by one of three prisoners who had been left out of the county jail without a guard on the day of the incident.

George Tokarchik of Johnstown subsequently was tried and convicted of two charges—aggravated assault and battery and assault with intent to ravish. He was sentenced to serve 2½ to 5 years in the Western Penitentiary upon completion of a previous sentence.

Shettig's preliminary objections to the suit assert that "there is no such entity either incorporated or unincorporated as the board of inspectors of the Cambria County Jail." (This is the formal title of the group commonly referred to as the prison board.)

The prison board, he said, "is only a means whereby certain of the government activities of this county are administered... the county is not liable in damages in any recurrence taking place in the activities of the county in connection with its governmental functions."

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Barr Twp. School Board Requests Dismissal of Case

Says Teacher Hired Only As Substitute

The members of the Barr Twp. School Board and Dr. Arthur M. Stull, Cambria County superintendent of schools, have asked the county court to dismiss the case filed against them by a dismissed school teacher who has taken legal steps in an effort to regain her job.

A reply to the complaint filed against the school board by Mrs. Collette B. Weiland was filed in court by Attorneys J. Harrison Westover and John P. Lantzy.

Mrs. Weiland asserts that she served two years as a temporary employee of the school district with satisfactory rating and thus was entitled to permanent teacher status at the beginning of the current school term.

The Barr Twp. board, which did not rehire Mrs. Weiland at the beginning of the new term, denies that she was a temporary employee for two years. Instead, the board says, she was a substitute teacher and as such could be discharged at any time.

Paris alleged in the complaint, says the board, are not sufficient to establish Mrs. Weiland's status as a professional employee and, therefore, the board is not required to tender her a teaching contract.

Moreover, the board says, Mrs. Weiland was not certified as satisfactory twice in each of the years she taught as is required for permanent status. Certifications are made by Dr. A. M. Stull, county superintendent, who is a co-defendant in the case along with the school district.

Dr. Stull's reply to the suit also was filed last Thursday. He pointed out that Mrs. Weiland was reported to him only as a substitute teacher and that the law neither required nor permitted him to certify her for permanent tenure. He also disputed Mrs. Weiland's claim by asserting that at no time did she reach the status of a professional employee.
