LaBelle, Bob Weakland, Schall Chalk Up Scores; Mountaineers Play Good Defensive Ball Friday

Hastings High Hawks moved into first place tie with Spangler and Barnesboro last Friday night when they downed Carrolltown High Mountaineers, 19-0, in a Union Press-Courier Trophy League battle at Carrolltown. The Mountaineers are in last place in the league with 20 percent.

The Hawks scored the first TD in the opening minutes of the second period when Bobby Weakland passed 17 yards to Bobby LaBelle on the CHS 18. LaBelle then raced to paydirt. Routh's placement was good for the extra point.

On the following kick off the CHS had moved the ball from their own 34 to the Hastings 41. CHS then punted to HHS 33 and a penalty pushed HHS to their own 20. The half ended with HHS on their own 42.

The third quarter was a punting duel with neither team advancing past the enemy 40 yard line.

The Hawks then scored their final two touchdowns in the final frame. The first came after Schall recovered a CHS fumble on the Hastings 45. Ten ground plays later Bob Weakland plunged over the double stripe from the one. 1 Deer Annual Legal Limit No Matter When It's Killed

Some persons seem unsure as to the number of deer a hunter may legally kill in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

In the interest of complete understanding, the Game Commission issues this clarifying statement: There will be three separate deer seasons this year, as follows: The first will be for archery only, Oct. 15 to 27, inclusive, except the Sunday. In addition to a current Pennsylvania hunting license, a special \$2.00 archery license is required. Both these licenses are necessary for everybody who desires to hunt deer in the special archery season (no exceptions). The second season, Dec. 3 to 12, inclusive, when only the regular hunting license is needed. In both of these seasons only male deer with two or more points to one antler may be taken. In the third, or antlerless season, Dec. 14 and 15, only deer without viable antlers may be harvested. A \$1.00 antlerless license is required in the regular hunting season.

5 Steeler Games Over Both Area Video Stations

Five football games scheduled by the Pittsburgh Steelers will be televised both over WJAC-TV, Johnstown, and WDTV, Pittsburgh, as announced by C. J. Fisher of Patton Auto Co., Patton, and W. G. Thomas of Main Street Garage, Carrolltown.

They are two of the Chevrolet dealers in the tri-state district who are jointly co-sponsoring the telecasts, which will include all the away games of the Steelers except an Oct. 7 game with the Packers at Green Bay, Wis., where there are no facilities for telecasting.

This will be the first season the "Broad" games of the Steelers will appear on district TV screens—games staged in Pittsburgh will not be shown.

Televised games will be played Sunday afternoons, as follows: Oct. 21, Cleveland Browns; Oct. 28, Chicago Cardinals; Nov. 22, Philadelphia Eagles; Dec. 2, New York Giants; and Dec. 16, Washington Redskins. Joe Tucker, well known sportscaster, will be commentator for several games.

The Steelers, who will open with a night game at Pittsburgh next Monday, Oct. 1, are expected to field a team with one of the finest offensive punches in years.

With John Michaelson serving his fourth season as head coach, the team will feature such "rockies" as Chuck Ortman, a former Michigan U. star, and Ray Matthews, who won gridiron fame at Clemson University. In the backfield will lead edge Gert, all-league tailback of '50; Lynn Chandross, starting his second year, and Jerry Nzum and Joe Gasparella.
