21 Killed, 368 Hurt On Cambria Roads Up Until November

Twenty-one persons have been killed and 368 injured in traffic accidents on Cambria County highways this year, according to the October report by state police at the Ebensburg barracks.

The toll is the highest for the corresponding period of any prior year. In addition, October accidents totaled the property loss past the quarter-million-dollar mark.

The October report shows that state police investigated 33 accidents in which 2 persons were killed, 27 were injured and 62 automobiles were damaged. The monthly damage amounted to \$21,350, making a total of \$256,000 for the year to date.

The 21 deaths this year is 56 percent above the total for the same period of last year. The number of accidents and injuries also have increased proportionately. Property loss estimates have increased 46 percent over last year.

'Wildlife in Color' New Book With 453 Illustrations

Copies to Be Available Beginning This Thursday

The National Wildlife Federation this week announces the publication of a new and spectacular book, "Wildlife in Color," by Roger Turr Peterson. The book will be available beginning today.

Some 453 full color illustrations from the famous Wildlife Stamps series of the federation highlight the book. The text by Mr. Peterson, combined with lavish color reproductions on nearly every page, makes it one of the most valuable and authoritative books on wildlife yet published.

"Wildlife in Color" is unique in that it presents its subjects by environments. Birds, animals, fish, trees, flowers, and insects all are grouped by habitat and area in which they are found. There are sections covering the Northwoods country, the South, the grass country, the desert, the West and the far North and the Arctic.

All through the many intimate glimpses into natural history fields, a conservation theme is woven. The stories and descriptions are in on-technical language that makes it extremely readable for both young and old.

"Wildlife in Color" will be of particular interest to all lovers of the outdoors, sportsmen, fishermen, travelers and nature students as well as teachers, boys and girls. The 453 color illustrations represent the work of America's foremost wildlife artists. There are also many excellent line drawings contributed by Mr. Peterson.

"Wildlife in color is 192 pages. The publisher is Houghton Mifflin Company. It will be available through the National Wildlife Federation, 3308 Fourteenth Street, N. W., Washington, D. C. Price per copy is \$3. Orders are being accepted by the federation now.
