

Christmas Seal Sale Off to Flying Start

The current Christmas Seal drive of the Johnstown Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis is off to a good start. This year's sales are 33 percent ahead of last year's, according to figures announced Monday of this week by Renho Alwinc, society president and chairman of the fund-raising campaign.

This year's goal is the same as that for 1950—\$20,000. Reports from the county areas probably will not be sent to the society's office in the Johnstown Bank & Trust Building until early January, according to Mr. Alwinc.

Frank J. Donahue, executive secretary, said the funds raised in Cambria County will be divided three ways. Eighty-eight percent will stay in the county to be spent for educational and medical needs in local communities.

The remaining 12 percent will be divided equally between headquarters of the National Tuberculosis Society in New York and the Pennsylvania Tuberculosis and Health Society with headquarters in Philadelphia. The 6 percent sent to the state society will be used for education, guidance and



of the society for more funds with which to expand its services.

Pointing out that the sale of Christmas Seals provides the society with its only financial support, he urged persons either to send in money or return their seals as soon as possible.

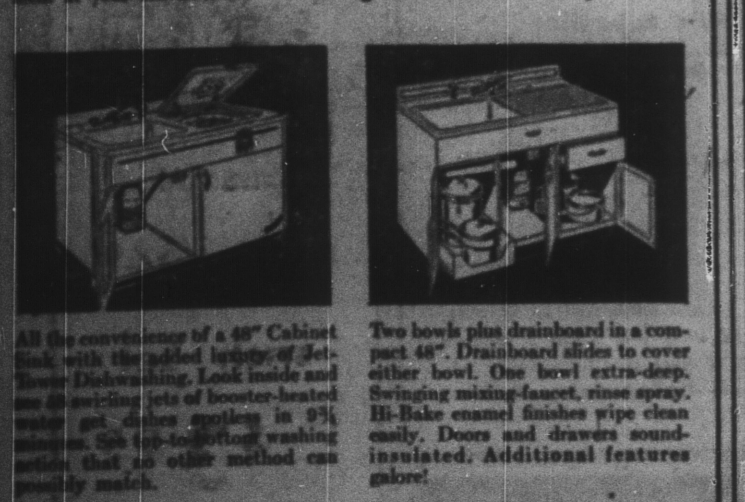
