Mine Workers Plan Greater Export Business for Product

Propose Cheaper Coal For Europe, Pacific

Washington—John L. Lewis has disclosed details of a plan devised by his United Mine Workers and coal operators to ship more and cheaper coal to Europe.

Lewis said the plan, already proposed to the government, calls for a shipping pool, organized by the union and the coal industry to charter moth-balled cargo ships to carry coal economically to strictest countries of Europe.

He said high ocean shipping costs have cost the United States many coal export markets and have forced Western Europe to go behind the Iron Curtain to buy Manchurian coal at \$30 a ton.

The shipping pool would be organized by the union and the coal industry, he said. For that reason, he added, it would not be a burden on the taxpayers.

The government has not yet acted on the plan, which Lewis said would enable the nation to "continue in the coal export business even in normal times."

Lewis said a ton of coal which costs \$10.50 at an East Coast port now carries a \$14.50 Transatlantic freight charge. This is totally unnecessary, he said, and means Europe must buy a "vast amount" of Iron Curtain coal—at cheaper rates, with money we provide.

The mine workers' chief said the proposed pool also would operate in the Pacific. There, he said, Japan must pay \$30.50 a ton for U. S. coal and, as a result recently arranged with Russia to buy Manchurian coal at \$30 a ton.

There is no reason why coal should not be delivered practically

at cost to overseas markets," he said.

Lewis added that there are plenty of government-owned vessels, mostly Liberty ships, available for greatly-increased exports to Europe.

Coal exports this year totalled only about 35 million tons and the industry hopes to ship at least 50 million tons abroad in 1952. The industry needs foreign markets because of increased domestic use of oil and natural gas.
