Cambria County's March grand jury completed its week's work in Ebensburg last Thursday by returning its customary report to the court.

The report, drawn up after an inspection tour of county-owned buildings, suggested several repairs or improvements but no major changes in the county institutions.

These include the children's home, home for the aged, the county jail, detention home and the courthouse itself.

In concluding its report, the jury recommended consideration be given to the salaries and wages paid to county institutional employees. However, no specific recommendations were made.

Jurors said they found the county buildings in good condition and commended department heads and officials they met during the four-day tour.

Most recommendations pertained to the new children's home, now nearing completion. The jury recommended additional bath facilities in the nursery, additional clothes closets and cupboard space, and installation of a dumb waiter between the kitchen and basement food storage room.

18th Bituminous District Has Slight Drop In Production

966,537 Tons Mined in Northeast Cambria

A slight drop in coal production was noted during the past year in the State's 18th Bituminous District, which includes the Northeastern section of Cambria County and all of Blair, Huntingdon, Bedford and Fulton Counties.

In his annual inspection report, Richard E. George of Altoona, inspector in the 18th District, listed a 12,332-ton drop. Total production for 1951 was 2,019,277 tons. During the year there were 60 mines in operation in the district. There were two fatal accidents.

Cambria County mines led the deep mine production with 966,537 tons. Other deep mine tonnage included Huntingdon, 392,841; Bedford, 271,377; Blair, 248,175; and Fulton, 140,247 tons.

Strip mining produced 471,298 tons in Cambria, 192,986 in Huntingdon, 152,764 in Blair, 132,503 in Fulton, and 75,184 tons in Bedford County.

Nearly 4 Million Births During '51

Preliminary figures indicate a record 3,828,000 births in the United States in 1951, the Public Health Service reported this week in Washington. Previous high was 3,818,000 in 1947.

Because of the small difference between the two figures, it is necessary to wait for final data for 1951 before determining whether 1951 is definitely the all-time high, the agency said in a news release.

The infant mortality rate dropped last year for the 15th straight year. The 1951 rate was 28.8 per 1,000 live births, contrasted with 47.4 in 1940 and 64.8 in 1950.

The national over-all death rate last year was listed as 9.7 per 1,000, practically the same as for 1950.
