

Two Scholarship Exams Scheduled Early Part of May

North Cambria Seniors' Tests At Courthouse

Dates for two scholarship examinations for senior students in Cambria County high school are announced by Dr. A. M. Stull, the county superintendent of schools. Exams for the John J. Haluska Scholarship, sponsored by Cambria County American Legion,

will be conducted Thursday, May 1—with entrants from the north of the county taking tests at the Ebsenburg Courthouse and those from the south at Johnstown High School. One winner from the two groups will be awarded a scholarship to the University of Pittsburgh.

School principals have until April 14 to submit the list of entrants from respective schools. To qualify for the test each student must submit a 1,500-word essay on the subject, "Government Or, By, and For the People."

To take tests at Ebsenburg are students from Adams Twp., Barnesboro, Black Lick Twp., Carrolltown, Ebsenburg-Cambria, Galitzin, Hastings, Lily-Washington Twp., Patton, Portage Joint,

Reade Twp., Spangler, Beaverdale, Wilmore, and Vintondale. The exam for the scholarship sponsored by the State Dept. of Public Instruction is scheduled Friday, May 2. All students entered in this one will take tests in the main courtroom of Ebsenburg Courthouse beginning at 8:45 a. m. (DST). The winner will receive \$400 toward a four-year course at any college or university approved by the Pennsylvania Council of Education.

Deadline for entering this contest was Apr. 2 and entries have been forwarded to Harrisburg.

Governor Proclaims Apr. 11 Good Friday

Harrisburg—Governor Fine has proclaimed tomorrow, Friday, April 11, as "Good Friday" in Pennsylvania and declared that it is a day, "on which all citizens should humbly seek the comfort and uplifting influence of prayer for the peace of the world and the redemption of mankind."

He pointed out that Good Friday "will always be a reminder that each of us, too, must carry the Cross voluntarily" by sharing the trials and tribulations of others.

The Governor asked that the day be observed as a Holy Day by attending churches and participating in prayers and services appropriate to the sacred character of the day.

Children's Home Matron Dies After 28 Years' Service

Mrs. Emma Dougherty Native of Barnesboro

Mrs. Emma Jane Dougherty, matron of Cambria County Children's Home, Ebsenburg, died last Saturday afternoon in Johnstown Memorial Hospital at the age of 72. She had been ill for the past several months.

The Ebsenburg woman's death ended a service of more than 28 years at the county home. Becoming affiliated with the institution at its founding in 1923, she assumed the post of matron in 1933.

Prior to that time, she served as assistant matron under Mr. and Mrs. Charles Boney and later under Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Lambert. A daughter, Miss Helen Dougherty, has served with her mother as assistant matron since 1933.

As matron, Mrs. Dougherty received statewide recognition. In October, 1950, she was awarded a certificate of merit from the State Dept. of Health and a letter of commendation from Gov. James H. Duff for her success in managing her state-sponsored child feeding program at the home.

Her work in this line received additional recognition in August, 1951, when she was commended on the physical condition of the children at the home following a series of nutrition tests given by Ellen H. Richards institute, School of Chemistry and Physics, Penn State College.

A native of Barnesboro, Mrs. Dougherty was born Oct. 25, 1879, a daughter of Benjamin and Mary (McAnulty) Whited. She received her education in Garmentown Public School and for a time attended the Presbyterian Hospital School of Nursing in Pittsburgh.

Mrs. Dougherty is survived by a daughter, Mary Helen, mentioned, and a brother and two sisters—Mrs. Rachael Tibbitt, Barnesboro; Mrs. Bess Ingles of Detroit, Mich., and Robert Grumling of Cleveland, Ohio.

She was preceded in death by her husband, John Dougherty in 1917. She was a life-long member of Ebsenburg Christian Church.

Easter Program Slated For Meeting Tonight

Kiwanian E. W. Winslow of Patton, chairman of the interior club committee, had charge of the program at last Thursday's meeting of the Northern Cambria Kiwanis Club in Commercial Hotel, Patton.

"That" Winslow, who served as a first class seaman on a gun crew in World War I, spent the greater part of his time aboard the Transport Ship Leviathan. The speaker gave a most interesting account of that great ship and of the transportation of troops during the war.

"The Leviathan," said Mr. Winslow, "was the largest ship afloat at that time. She had a displacement of 68,000 tons. It required 41 feet of water to float her and she had a length equal to the height of the Flat Iron building with her width at the beam was equal to the length of a city block. Of the 1,000,000 sent overseas, the Leviathan carried some 210,000 or about one-twentieth of the expeditionary force. In addition to the 10,000 to 14,000 troops carried on each trip, the ship accommodated a crew of 2,300." These and many other interesting facts were related by the speaker.

A meeting of the Board of Directors was held after the regular session. With President Jess W. Cogley, presiding, a number of items of business were transacted. It was voted to sponsor a delegate to the Safety Patrol School to be held in August at St. Francis College, Loretto. The directors also voted to adopt as a project the promotion of the "Ballot Institution" with a special program devoted to this subject Apr. 17.

George Hoppel Jr., chairman of the program committee, announced that this week's program will be in charge of Robert Caldwell. This is scheduled as an Easter program and the members after dinner will adjourn to attend the church of their choice. Kiwanis will meet in Commercial Hotel at 6 o'clock tonight.

Malloy, Mitasky Sign for Duty With Army, Air Force

Two Northern Cambria men enlisted in the armed forces it was announced by Tech Sgt. Robert J. Snyder, in charge of the Barnesboro Recruiting Station. They are Thomas F. Malloy and Carl Malloy, sons of Robert F. Malloy, Sr. of Barnesboro.

Mr. Malloy, 19, a son of Mrs. Grace Malloy of Carrolltown, is a graduate of Carrolltown High School and was employed at the Letterkenny Depot, Chambersburg. He enlisted in the regular army for three years and will be assigned to an airborne unit. He will report to Ft. Meade, Md., for assignment. A brother, Niels, is serving with the Army and another brother, Vincent, is with the U. S. Navy. Two other brothers, Frank and Hugh, served in the army during World War II.

Mr. Mitasky, 30-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph J. Mitasky Sr., Barnesboro, is a graduate of Barnesboro High School and was employed by Artistic Card Co., Elmira, N. Y. He joined the air force and will report to Sampson AFB, Geneva, N. Y., for basic training.

Army Has Stock Of Victory Medals To Give Veterans

Uncle Sam has more medals than he knows what to do with. As a matter of fact, he's begging veterans to take them for free.

The army faces a serious medal problem since being unable to "unload" some 776,466 pounds of them. This includes everything from the Medal of Honor to the Victory Medal.

Speaking of the Victory Medal, there still are some 1.7 million left over even though the army already has given away 7.5 million.

The medals take up 23,320 square feet of space at the Philadelphia Quartermaster Corps warehouse. Cost of storage runs \$17,500 a year.

Veterans who have not received their medals can get them by writing to the Adjutant General, Department of the Army, Washington, 25, D. C., if they served in the army. If the veteran served in the navy or marine corps, he should write to Bureau of Naval Personnel, Dept. of the Navy, Washington, 25, D. C.

When writing for the medals, the veterans should give full name and address, serial number, service unit and theater in which he served.
