### Guardsmen to Have Preference in Jobs

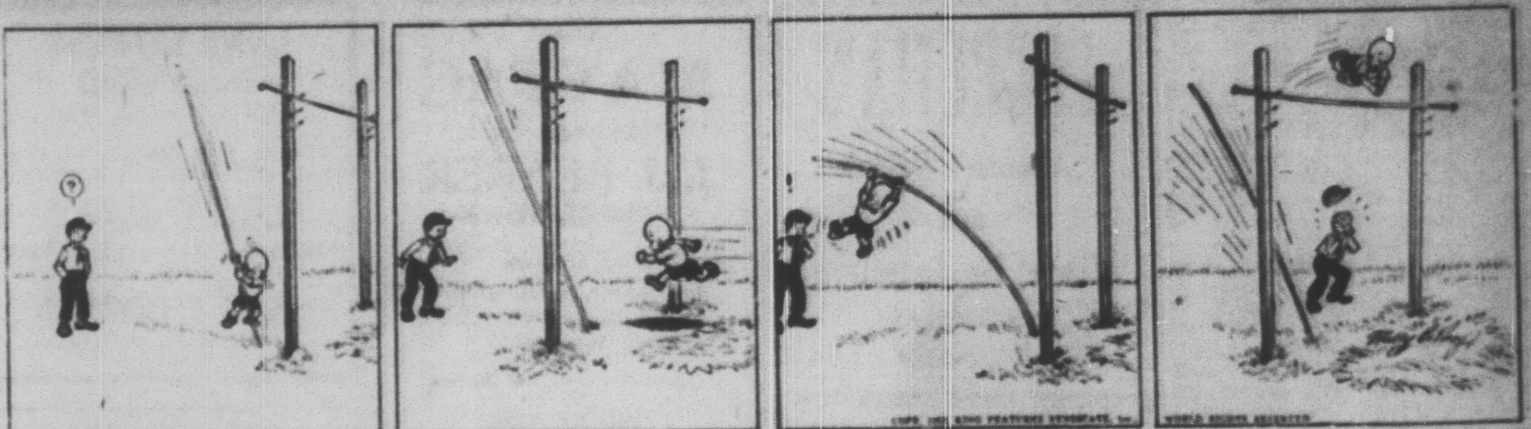
The State Department of Military Affairs this week promised all National Guardsmen who were employed on a full time status before being called into federal service that they would have the preference for any job vacancies in the department.

The adjutant general's office coupled the announcement with an appeal for employers throughout the state to follow suit.

The department said it had already rehired several former members of the 131st Transportation Company, a Pine Grove outfit that served 14 months in Korea. They are now working at the guard's state maintenance shops at Indiantown Gap.

The coroner said Mrs. Dout was riding in the rear seat of the car with her daughter, Mrs. Alice Guffey, a son, Arthur, and his wife were occupants of the front seat of the auto. Mrs. Dout was stricken about 5 p. m. as the party was entering Ebsenburg from the east on Route 22.

### Note Improvement At Westover Mine

Fifteen between-inspection improvements were completed at a Westover coal mine, according to the Bureau of Mines.

Making the improvements was the Cambria Clearfield Mining Company's Springfield 6 mine which employs 280 men, with a daily production of 1,700 tons.

Improvements included adopted timbering plan, caved in areas frequently inspected, working places well rock dusted and two rows of stoppings being used in each set of entries.

Inspector S. A. Magistrella who visited the mine asked proper roof support, removal of loose roof along haulageways, cleaning up accumulations of fine coal and dust along roadways and use of water to allay dust while drilling rock with percussion drills.
