Creature's Mother Usually Near Apparently Abandoned Wildlife

Despite repeated warnings and educational efforts many Pennsylvanians annually injure wildlife and break the law by taking home birds and animals they erroneously say are "lost" or are "motherless."

Rarely is a fawn deer or cub bear lost or its mother dead, necessitating human assistance. Almost never does a mother rabbit or bird desert her nest of young. Common sense should tell even a youngster that the timid mother has either been frightened out of sight by the approach of humans or is away temporarily, probably obtaining food.

There are rare cases when this does not apply. For example when a female rabbit with a nest of young has been killed by a dog or cat, or a deer with a very young fawn has been killed on the highway, there is one correct action to take—get in touch with the game protector who administers that area. Being trained in wildlife care he will know what to do, and his position indicates

he is the one legally authorized to take over in such case.

The animal of most concern to game administrators is the fawn deer. It seems that a person just must do something about the dappled little fellow he or she discovers looking so pathetically helpless and alone. It should be known that when a deer is raised by humans it loses its ability to subsist in the wild. Such care for itself inevitably ends up in a zoo, imprisoned for life, because some misguided person was "humane."

For several years, it seemed that the people of this state were learning that it was wrong and inhumane to pick up young birds and animals. Then, in 1951, the practice was resumed, this time in almost unprecedented amount.

The Game Commission warns that wildlife must be left in the wild, must be enjoyed where it is seen at this time of year, that action will be brought against those who insist on picking up wildlife.

Scare Treatment Is Favorite Method For Hiccup Cure

Boo! The scare treatment is a favorite with some folks for the curing of a person with hiccups. They usually stop after a time, but warns the Cambria County Medical Society, when they are persistent and will not stop, it is time to see a doctor.

Hiccups can be due to a variety of causes and are sometimes a symptom of disease such as appendicitis, liver trouble, diabetes, ulcer or brain tumor. Regardless of their cause, hiccups are the result of a disorder of the diaphragm.

This sheet of muscle, separating the abdominal from the chest cavity, is one of the main respiratory organs. As with other muscles of the body, the diaphragm twitches or contracts whenever a nervous impulse reaches it by way of its motor nerve. Anything that irritates the diaphragm can make it twitch, and so can anything that irritates the part of the brain where the respiratory center lies.

A physician, faced with a case of persistent hiccups, must locate the seat of the trouble, be it in the diaphragm itself or the brain or spinal cord or somewhere along the associated nerves.

The diaphragm produces involuntary, jerky contractions which are irregular so that the sufferer of hiccups doesn't know exactly when to expect the next. Physicians endeavor to go beyond this mechanism to get at the basic cause.

Everyone has a pet cure for hiccups, harmless enough providing they stop, and the cure has not brought about bodily injury.

The hiccup arising from a serious condition needs medical attention.
