

Torquato Renamed County Democratic Party Chairman

Mrs. Helen Beatie Also Elected Sans Opposition

John R. Torquato of Westmont was re-elected last Friday night for a sixth two-year term as the Cambria County Democratic chairman at the biennial convention of party committeemen and women held in Ebensburg courthouse. He was elected without opposition.

The county chairman lauded the Democratic administration, asserting that the people have more money after taxes than in all the previous administrations in our history.

State Sen. John J. Haluska, Patton, attacked the Republican state administration, declaring that a statement recently made by Gov. Fine proves his contention that a state income tax was not needed.

"The Republicans laughed at me when I said the proposed vicious income tax was not necessary," Sen. Haluska said.

"The statement made by Gov. Fine that there would be a surplus this year of \$23.3 million in the state treasury proves that I was correct. I saved the people of Pennsylvania \$130 million for the biennium through my efforts, courage, honesty in defeating the vicious income tax proposal."

Sen. Haluska declared that he believes former District Attorney Samuel R. DiFrancesco "will be with us in the coming election."

Mr. DiFrancesco supported Gov. J. Pavlick, the senators opponent, in the primaries.

Judge Ivan J. McKenrick lauded the delegates for reelecting Mr. Torquato.

Rep. Louis Rovaneck, Conemaugh, candidate for reelection, urged support of the entire Democratic ticket.

George C. Moppel, Patton, and Ransom Reeder, Westmont, delegates to the National Convention, were urged in a resolution, unanimously adopted, to confer with and abide by the wishes of the state leadership of the Democratic Party at the next convention.

Attorney William Shettig, nominee for Congressman, attacked the Republican party, urging the people to think back to the days of the depression.

Domestic Relations Conference Days Changed By Court

A change in the regular Cambria County court schedule was agreed upon last Wednesday by the county's judges and the district attorney's office.

In the future, all domestic relations cases and all appeals from summary convictions will be heard by the court on the fourth Monday of each month. Hereafter, such cases had been scheduled for the first Monday of each month.

District Attorney Fred J. Foss said the change was made because of the busy schedule of other court matters which normally come up on the first Monday of each month. This is particularly true in March, June, September and December when the grand jury is in session and there are more than the usual number of pleadings.

Although appeals and domestic relations cases were heard last Monday, other cases of this nature will be heard again on Monday, June 23, under the new schedule, and the fourth Monday of each month thereafter.

Order Many Trees For Strip Projects

More than 1,250,000 trees and shrub seedlings have been ordered by regional forests for planting on lands affected by open pit mining of bituminous coal prior to enactment of the strip mining law, according to the Department of Forests & Waters in Harrisburg.

Coal operators have ordered some 2,512,000 seedlings for planting on soil banks and backfills in accordance with the new regulations.

These figures totaling 3,900,000 trees represent approximately the number that will be planted on surface-mined lands during the current planting season.
