Well, as we pointed out last week, the "Show of Shows" is taking place. The editors of the Pennsylvania papers must have joined a union to promote the Eisenhower candidacy, for never in history has it been known that an inter-club meeting of any more radical attempt by the editors to place words in the mouths of Mr. and Mrs. Eisenhower.

Eisenhower, as a general, was in the field by himself and deserves all the praise and credit due him for work accomplished, but now, since he has entered the field of politics, he just does not know the score, and two Senators—namely Duff and Lodge—are using the General and molding him into shape much the same as a carpenter with a ball of yarn in the palm of his hand.

The one speech Eisenhower made already has changed the minds of thousands of people who may have supported his candidacy. Let us briefly analyze the remarks he made at Abilene, Kansas, particularly that the present Democratic Administration is a wasteful one and spends millions of dollars in the European Theater without much success.

Now, let us assume that Eisenhower is correct in his statement—is it not true that he went in charge as Supreme Commander while this money was being spent? Is it not true that it was his duty to confirm all the expenditures that were made while he was in the capacity of a General and Supreme Commander? Is it not true that he informed the President of the United States and Congress that he wanted the ground forces backed up with tanks, planes, shells and guns? Is it not true that he advocated millions of dollars in the expenditures of his demands?
