20% Charity Gifts To Be Tax Exempt

The U. S. Senate has passed a bill which originated in the House that would increase from 15 to 20 percent the amount of one's income able to be deducted from income tax is devoted to gifts of

charity. Thus individuals would be permitted to deduct up to one-fifth of their income for charitable purposes.

The Senate amended the House bill in regard to proceeds of sports programs devoted to the Red Cross and now the bill is in conference between committees from both houses.

The original Red Cross provision was that professional baseball clubs might devote a day's proceeds tax-free to the Red Cross but it was pointed out that other charities would seek similar favors.
