TODAYS Menu Graham Cracker Crumb Crust For Two Delicious Desserts

By ALICE DENBOFF NOW comes the season to make everything as easy as possible for yourself around the house, and especially in the kitchen. Of course, the family must be fed well as always, and sometimes it is more of a task than ever, especially with busy eaters and those whose appetite lags in the warm weather. In the dessert department, we have found that delicious, crunchy graham cracker crumb crust makes pie-making a cinch. It's so simple to make, so foolproof, takes so many shapes, that it emerges as a busy bargain recipe. Cream together one c. cottage cheese and a 3-oz. package cream cheese; add grated rind of 1/2 lemon and 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Add gelatin mixture. Chill until mixture begins to thicken. Beat 1/2 c. light cream until foamy; add juice of 1/2 lemon, whipping until thickened. Fold cream and stiffly beaten egg white into cheese mixture. Pour into crumb crust in refrigerator tray. Chill until firm. Cut into wedge-shaped pieces. Serves 6.

Ban On Color TV Lifted This Week

The government this week lifted its ban on the manufacture of color television sets for home and theater use. The National Production Authority (NPA) replaced the outright prohibition with an order permitting manufacture by firms which can prove that color TV will not obstruct their defense output. However, Administrator Henry H. Fowler, who signed the order, said he expected that few makers of radio and TV sets for homes would be able to qualify because most are deeply in defense work. NPA indicated its belief that the shortage of electronic engineers and technicians, which has become more acute since the order was issued, would prevent any mass output of color equipment.
