Former Area Priest Buried On Saturday

Death stroke for the third time in five months in a former Loretto family when the Rev. Father Francis Biter, 59, pastor of St. Ann's Catholic Church, Kansas City, Mo., died last Wednesday in St. Vincent's Hospital, at Erie.

Death was attributed to a heart attack. The priest's father, Anselm J. Biter, died May 22, and a brother, Ferdinand J., died on Feb. 20.

Father Biter was born Oct. 22, 1892, in Galitzin, a son of Anselm J. and Margaret (O'Day) Biter. The family later moved to Loretto and lived there for many years. The deceased was ordained in 1917 in Buffalo, N. Y., for the Kansas City diocese. He assumed the pastorate at St. Ann's Church in 1922 and had served there since that time.
