Father Ben English Member Franciscan Order 65 Years

Many Former Students Now Prominent Men

Father Benedict English, TOR, oldest Third Order Regular Franciscan in the United States in his 65th year and who observed his 61st birthday July 13, was the guest of honor on his birthday at a dinner in the community dining room of St. Francis Seminary, Loretto, Frisling, Spalding, TOR, religious superior of the Loretto Seminary, was host at the affair. The priest will observe the sixty-fifth anniversary of his entrance into the Franciscan Order in August.

Father English, who is now in residence in Saint Francis Seminary, is a former president of St. Francis College, Loretto; Trinity College, Sioux City, Iowa; and Spalding College, Spalding, Neb. The latter institutions were formerly conducted of the Third Order Regular Franciscans of Loretto, but were relinquished by them so that they could concentrate the financial resources in conducting the expansion program of the greater St. Francis College. This expansion was inaugurated in the early 1920's.

The venerable priest, who is affectionately known as "Father Ben" to the hundreds of students who attended the three institutions that he headed and to his innumerable friends throughout the United States, is the best known Third Order Regular Franciscan in the United States.

Father English's greatest accomplishment during his two terms as president of the Loretto College was the acquisition of a university charter for old Saint Francis from the Department of Public Instruction of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It was this act of Father English that made possible an academic expansion program which has since made St. Francis College one of the first reputable smaller colleges of the East. Many a local boy is now a doctor, a lawyer, or a professional man of some kind because of the foresight of the Grand Old Man of St. Francis who made attainable for him a college education close to home that he might otherwise have never been able to afford.

Father Ben's students have in many instances become leaders in business, political, professional and religious life. He was born in Anglesboro, County Limerick, Ireland, on July 13, 1871, the son of John and Nora Caplan English. He and a sister, Nora (Nana) English, of Los Angeles, Cal., are the sole survivors of a family of 5 other boys and 2 other girls.

Father English left his native Ireland for the United States at 16 years of age in the summer of 1887 to become a member of the Franciscan Brothers in Brooklyn and Jersey City, N. J. The young brother became in a short time an accomplished organist.

When in 1908 Blessed Pius X, who was known as Pope Pius X, issued a rescript permitting the Franciscan Brothers of Brooklyn to affiliate with the newly formed province of the Sacred Heart of Jesus of the Third Order Regular of St. Francis, the motherhouse of which was established at Loretto, Brother Benedict, as Father English was then known, elected to join the new province.

Furthermore when the Holy Father granted the privilege of permitting those Brothers who became affiliated with the Third Order Regular to become Priests of the Order, provided they completed full courses of study in philosophy and sacred theology, Brother Benedict chose to become a priest. After completing his seminary course in Saint Francis Seminary, he was ordained to the priesthood on June 23, 1914.

Fewer Divorces Noted In State During 1951

There were fewer divorces in Pennsylvania last year than in 1950.

The Federal Security Agency reported there were 84,956 marriages in Pennsylvania last year compared with 89,669 in 1950. The comparable figures on divorces were 10,888 and 12,140 respectively.

The decline in both categories follows a national trend. Federal Security said the 1951 marriage rate dropped to its lowest point since 1938, and the divorce rate to its lowest since 1951.
