Carrolltown Veterans of Foreign Wars softball squad racked up two victories, suffered a defeat and battled to a tie in last week's action in the Cambria County VFW Softball League. The Carrolltown squad played to a 10-inning 3-3 deadlock last Wednesday with South Fork; edged past Portage last Friday, 2-1; suffered a 9-5 defeat by Portage Sunday and ended its week's action by topping over Ebenburg, 3-1, Monday evening of this week.

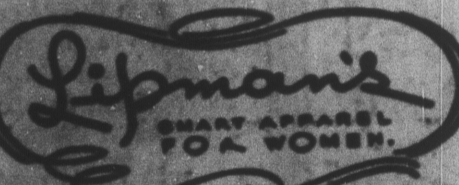
