19-Year-Olds May Be Called Up Soon. By Draft Boards

Selective service may have to dip into its pool of 19-year-olds soon, a spokesman said in Washington this week. Young men, 20 and older, are still being used to fill draft calls across the nation, the spokesman reported, and as far as is known no local draft board is now calling 19-year-olds. But increased needs for manpower in the nation's armed forces may force Selective Service to turn to the younger category. The stepped-up tempo of the draft was emphasized by a call this week for 47,000 draftees in October—a 17,000 increase over the 30,000 asked for September. The Army, the only service now taking draftees, said the big number is needed because men inducted during late 1950 are nearing the end of their tours and must be replaced. The Navy and Air Force have relied on volunteers and the Marine Corps stopped taking draftees last May.

Hastings Soldier in Korea Gets Infantryman's Badge

Cpl. Donald E. Wolf, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Wolf, Route 1, Hastings, has been awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge while serving with the 25th Infantry Division in Korea. The badge, a symbol of the frontline fighting man, consists of a miniature replica of a Revolutionary War flintlock mounted on a blue background and superimposed on a silver wreath. An assistant squad leader with Company B, 25th Infantry Regiment, Cpl. Wolf entered the U. S. Army in July, 1951. He arrived in Korea last March.

Three Jailbreakers Get Terms in Pen

Additional 6 Months To 3 Years Is Penalty. Three prisoners who were recaptured shortly after their escape from the Cambria County Jail are to be removed to Western Penitentiary, Pittsburgh. The unsuccessful attempt to escape custody was made July 25 by Hugh A. Myers, 28, and his brother, William G. Myers, 30, formerly of Hastings, and Joseph M. Diabelko, 23, Johnstown. Monday they appeared before the court at Ebensburg and pleaded guilty to the formal charge of prison breach. In addition to being transferred to the Western Penitentiary to serve out their unexpired terms, each was given an additional sentence. They are to serve sentences of from six months to three years beyond the term of the sentences they were serving when they jumped over the prison wall. When they made their short-lived break the Myers brothers were serving six months to three years sentences for larceny and receiving stolen goods. The additional sentence imposed will at least double their jail time. Diabelko, who was involved in several Johnstown burglaries, was serving an 18-month to six year sentence. His minimum sentence now will be 24 months.
