

# Barnesboro Missionaries Tell Of Conditions In Red China

## People Forced to Agree With Communist Regime

Rev. and Mrs. Harry E. Glass, Barnesboro native and returned missionaries, have related some of the perils and suffering that accompany living in Communist-dominated China.

The couple, both ordained ministers, spent almost six years in the Far East during their missionary work in China they saw the Reds take over the government.

Rev. Glass, while recounting some of his experiences as a missionary for the Pentecostal Holiness denomination, said his life and the lives of his wife and their 3-year-old daughter, Carol Elizabeth, were threatened. He said the natives, at the instigation of the Reds, also stoned and killed and spit at them.

The couple served in Southern China and the Hong Kong area from October, 1945, until May, 1951. They said that during the first three years of their ministry they were welcomed and treated kindly by the Chinese. All of that was changed, though, when the Reds took over from the Nationalist Government.

The missionary couple said many of the Chinese, through Red propaganda, were led to believe that the Americans were the cause of all their troubles, including financial and political. The ill-treatment of Americans followed.

However, Rev. Glass stated that he believes the Red regime eventually will be ousted by those they now dominate. He said he believes the Nationalists will regain control of the country.

The minister pointed out that the Communists have a difficult time keeping some of the provinces under control. He said bands of guerrillas frequently drive the Reds from their headquarters.

The clergyman said the Chinese people were forced to agree with the doctrine of the Reds. If they disagreed, they were apt to be shot, placed in slave camps or have their homes destroyed, he stated.

Rev. Glass declared the conditions under which the Chinese live are worse than they were during the Japanese occupation. He said the landlord system has been done away with and the people are taxed so greatly that they are poverty-stricken.

He said domestic life in China today is broken up. When boys and girls become 15 years old they are separated from their families by the government, he stated. Thus family ties, which historically are strong among the Chinese, are broken.

The Barnesboro native said the non-Red Chinese were dumbfounded when Gen. Douglas MacArthur was relieved of his Far East command. They believed he was the one man who could liberate them. The clergyman said MacArthur was idolized by many in the Far East. He was feared as an enemy, but loved as a friend.

Rev. Glass said there were a number of classes of people ranging from poor to rich. When he began his work in China, that now is all changed, he asserted, and today there are only the poor except for some of the Reds. The only thing that counts there today, he said, is the ability to do hard manual labor.

The missionary said that in his work he found it hard to get the people to accept Christianity, because they had been taught to hate instead of love. However, once they become Christians, he stated, they defend their beliefs to the utmost.

There is no education system in China so to speak, Rev. Glass stated. Schools are very primitive in organization, he pointed out, and Chinese high schools are only equivalent to our elementary schools. All schooling in China is paid for by the individual and attendance is not compulsory, he said.

While in Southern China, Rev. Glass traveled with his family from village to village by jeep and motor-propelled boat. The couple served an area of 388 square miles. They established eight mission stations and organized Bible schools with the assistance of 33 workers.

Rev. and Mrs. Glass both speak the Cantonese dialect. Mrs. Glass is the former Sylvia Krouse, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Krouse of Barnesboro. The missionaries' daughter, Carol Elizabeth, was born Sept. 2, 1950, at a British-controlled hospital in China.

# Clarence Edwards Gets Probation In Shooting Uncle

## In Shooting Uncle

Clarence Edwards of Ebensburg R. D. 2, was given a three-year probationary sentence when he pleaded guilty in Cambria County Court last Wednesday to a charge of involuntary manslaughter.

The 46-year-old defendant was under indictment for the fatal shooting of his uncle, William Thomas Edwards, 67, also of Ebensburg R. D. The shooting occurred Apr. 18 at the Black Lick Township farm of E. E. Edwards, father of the defendant and brother of the victim.

In placing the defendant on probation, Judge John H. McCann said "it is useless to send this man to jail. He's a hopeless cripple." A victim of infantile paralysis, Edwards is unable to walk without help from other persons.

Edwards said the shooting of his uncle was accidental. The order Edwards was in a barn at the farm when Clarence fired a shot from the house porch with a .22-caliber rifle. The shot passed through the barn wall and struck his uncle in the abdomen.

The defendant admitted he knew his uncle was in the barn but denied that he knew his exact whereabouts there. He said he only wanted to scare the victim. Investigators agreed that the defendant could not have seen his uncle in the barn.
