Miners, Soft Coal Operators Sign New Contract Monday

10c Boost in Royalty Is Part of Agreement

John L. Lewis and northern coal operators signed a one-year contract in Washington on Monday of this week, but the Northern Coal Operators' Association, signed the northern agreement, after the contracts were approved unanimously by the 200-man party committee of Lewis' United Mine Workers.

Besides the \$1.90 hike bringing the basic daily wage of miners to \$13.90 a day pay boost couldn't be paid the miners until approved by the Government's Wage Stabilization Board.

Lewis and Harry Moses, president of the Bituminous Coal Operators' Association, signed the northern agreement, after the contracts were approved unanimously by the 200-man party committee of Lewis' United Mine Workers.

Meanwhile, it was learned that Moses has written all his association's members that any pay increases paid without government approval would be "at your own risk."

Moses' letter said if the WSB does not act on the new pay increase by Oct. 15, when the pay checks containing the higher wage are normally due, he will advise the union that "we cannot legally pay the increases until the approval is forthcoming."

This raised the possibility of a coal strike in the northern soft coal mines on Oct. 15 if the higher pay rates are not paid because of a WSB delay in acting on the new contract terms.

Lewis, at a news conference with Moses after they signed the agreement, said that he was highly gratified that the pact had been negotiated without a strike.
