Colver Community Chest Has \$1,000 Over 1952-53 Goal

Colver's 1952 Community Chest drive has gone over the top by an estimated \$1,000.

This year's campaign to raise \$4,070 began Monday, Oct. 20, and closed officially on Monday of this week.

During a report meeting of all Chest workers Monday evening in Holy Family Catholic Church Hall, Colver, officials reported that the drive has netted more than \$7,000 in pledges and contributions.

Joseph W. Cizaki, chairman of the board of directors, and Walter Angst, campaign chairman, praised workers for their outstanding job in pushing the drive over the top within one week's time.

It was announced that contributions were accepted for the first time this year from students in the Colver School. Officials reported that the youngsters contributed almost 100 percent.

Heaviest contributor to this year's Chest campaign was Colver Local 860, United Mine Workers of America. Members of the local pledged \$5 each toward the drive. The contribution totaled approximately \$4,000.

Final report will be made at a meeting next Monday in the church.

The chapter made plans to hold a concert bridge for the benefit of the library fund to be held early in the spring.

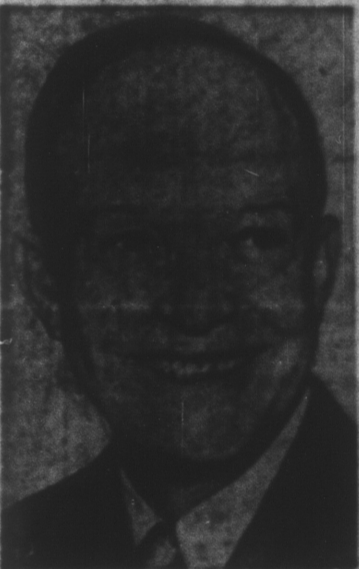
Expands Service
