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# SPORT SPOTS

## Well it's all over but the shouting! Or is it?

The eight Northern Cambria high schools have ended their 1952 gridiron campaigns as of Tuesday of this week. Several of these teams have posted some fine records. This week, however, we would like to devote our attention to the final two Courier League games and next week we will sum up the season's record of each such squad. We will discuss this time to compile the statistics and gather other information pertaining to each team.

Let's begin with last Friday night's Carrolltown-Barnesboro clash at Barnesboro.

The Dragons, who plowed through a tough season with 9 wins and a tie with Ebensburg, really had their hands full when they charged against the fighting Mountaineers of Carrolltown. Going into the game with only one defeat, the gridgers of Coach J. C. Lacey, gave the football fans of this area a real show as they fought on even terms with a powerful aggregation from Barnesboro. Outside of the thrilling Ebensburg-Barnesboro battle on Oct. 10, this was the best work to lead the league last week with scores of 217 and 224. For the Legion it was Volk with 160 and Waugh with 447.

The match which the Vets claimed for forfeit over the Slovaks on Friday, Oct. 10, is now under protest and may make a change in the standings.

Friday night the Slovaks decided to go on the rampage and rained the Legion's 4-0. Kinkaid did the best work to lead the league last week with scores of 217 and 224. For the Legion it was Volk with 160 and Waugh with 447.

Outside of the battle with Class A Ebensburg, the Carrolltown game was the toughest Barnesboro encountered all season. A new CHS defense stopped the Dragons continually and a deceptive offense showed everyone that "little" Carrolltown can produce a football team, too.

Barnesboro won Carrolltown last but the Mountaineers need not be ashamed of the defeat nor the way they played the game. Tuesday night the powerful Dragon from Barnesboro showed its teeth and the Vets and Spirit fire to subdue Spangler, 33-13 and end the '52 campaign undefeated with only a tie to mar the otherwise perfect record.

The victory of the players led to the George Magulick's boys permanent possession of the Union Press-Courier trophy, by virtue of winning the crown twice. It also gave the Vets and Spirit players the crown of the Western Conference. In 1950 the Wildcats of Spangler plowed to an undefeated season. East Tuesday afternoon Nov. 5 the blue-and-gold Parochials defeated Revloc, 19-7, in the final game of the Cambria County Boys Football League. Coach St. Benedict's upset the Barnesboro Aces, 25-0, in the preliminary game before the Barnesboro-Carrolltown high game at Barnesboro Stadium.

Tony Wentz, St. Benedict half-back, scored all three of the touchdowns in the Revloc tilt. He raced 65 yards for the first six-point, 32 yards for the second and plunged 7 yards for the third score. Miller of Revloc did the honors for his team when he sprinted 55 yards into paydirt.

The Parochials held an 11-7 edge in first downs and gained 225 net yards compared to 180 for Revloc.

Last Friday night the Parochials surprised the Barnesboro team of Coach Wagner when they rambled to a 25-6 victory under lights of Barnesboro Stadium. This was the only non-league contest the Parochials played this season. First downs were 12-4 in favor of Carrolltown with Tony Wentz, Bud Mangold and Bob Kelly scoring the TD's. Kelly crossed the goal line twice.

The Parochials ended the league season with 6 wins and 3 defeats for third position in the final loop standing.

**Friday's Contest At Barnesboro Is Topic Of Letter**

Many people from this area attended the Barnesboro-Carrolltown football game last Friday night at Barnesboro Stadium. It surely was a very close game in all respects.

The Mountaineers from Carrolltown outplayed the Dragons the entire game. When we say this we are sure every fan that witnessed the game will agree with our statement. The Dragons knew they were playing football!

While talking to a friend it was related that Barnesboro was a rough outfit. In our estimation, however, it wasn't rough but unsportsman-like football due to the fact that the Carrolltown players came out of the game with mangled faces, arms and legs, caused by finger-nail scratches, which made the blood come. We also saw several Carrolltown boys with teeth marks on their arms and legs and one player in particular who received at least two bloody noses while he was wearing a nose guard on his helmet. Something must have been wrong if a player with a nose guard received two punches in the nose while the helmet was still on his head. Yet, the next day while attending the Patton-Cresson game in Patton, we heard several of the BHS players bragging about Friday night's contest.

Well football fans, if this kind of thing keeps up, Cambria County will soon be receiving a bad name for the way its teams participate in sports.

The game was a good one and showed some fine football playing. The Mountaineers, however, need not bow their heads, they have a 1952 season's record of seven wins and two defeats, both of these losses by not more than six points.

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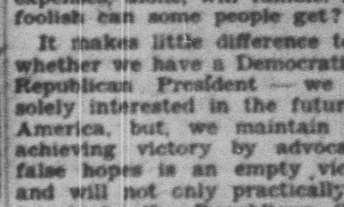
