## Cambria County's Absentee Soldier Ballots Favor Ike

Cambria County residents in military service did not see eye-to-eye with the county's civilian voters in the Nov. 4 primary election.

Those from the county casting absentee ballots favored President-elect Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower over his Democratic opponent Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson.

Tabulation of the military ballots completed over the last week end showed that a total of 712 Cambria County persons in the armed forces voted in the Presidential election. Of the total cast 412 went to Eisenhower and 380 to Stevenson. Rep. John Saylor polled the highest military vote with 452.

**Your Nov. 4 Ballot Cost Cambria 25c**  
The election held in Cambria County on Tuesday of last week cost about 25 cents per ballot. More than 80,000 ballots were cast and the cost was \$21,313.

Major item of cost was \$19,287 for payment of election board members and constables and for erection of the voting booths in the 182 precincts. Also included was rental of polling places.

Another \$1,791 was paid for the printing of ballots. Advertising cost \$233.64—\$183.75 for an election proclamation and \$49.89 for bids on ballot printing. The advertising total does not include money spent for proclamations for special balloting in several districts.

The election work still is not entirely completed. Last Friday the computation board started a count of the ballots. However, the complete count won't be announced until after the military ballots are canvassed, and that will be on Friday of this week.

## Road Fund Urged By Highway Head

E. L. Schmidt, state secretary of highways, said Wednesday that at least 150 million dollars must be spent each year for 12 years to bring Pennsylvania's 41,000-mile road system up to standard.

"This highway problem is like an octopus," Schmidt said in an address before the 12th annual assembly of Inter-American Federation of Automobile Clubs in Philadelphia.

"No sooner is one tentacle severed than another is grown to take its place," he added.

"In Pennsylvania, although more than 100 million dollars are being spent annually for highway improvements, our estimates are that 150 millions should be spent each year for the next 12 years to bring our 41,000-mile system up to standard," Schmidt said.

The course will consist of 45 hours of classroom teaching and practice under a qualified nurse-instructor. This is followed by 100 hours of supervised practice in the hospital.

Women should be between 18 and 50, in good physical health, and have completed eight grades of school. Necessary information on the course may be had by writing Miss Ethel Blair at the hospital.
