Tunnelhill Residents Have Running Water

The residents of Tunnelhill Borough here had running water in their homes for the first time last Monday. Residents of the small borough, located on top of the mountain, had depended on the wells in their yards to supply them with the precious liquid. During the dry seasons many of the wells would go dry, and residents would be compelled to carry or haul water from whatever source they could find. Monday the water was turned into the pipes, supplying 55 families on Sandusky and Tunnelhill streets. Efforts of the people themselves made the dream a reality, for it was they who purchased the pipes and dug their own ditches, so the lines could be laid.
