Hurt in Highway Mishaps In Month

Seventeen persons were injured in highway accidents last month in Cambria County, according to state police of the Ebensburg sub-station.

November was the fifth month this year in which there were no fatal accidents on the county's highways. The other months were February, March, April and Oc- tober.

The traffic casualty list com- piled at Ebensburg does not in- clude accidents in Johnstown or other municipalities where local police handle accident investiga- tions. It shows only the toll from accidents outside the city and major boroughs.

Twenty-seven accidents involv- ing 46 cars and resulting in a property loss of \$12,295 were in- vestigated last month.

Twenty-five persons were in- jured in a similar number of ac- cidents in October, police said. A total of 45 cars figured in the October crashes and property damage was set at \$12,250.
