Civil Defense Cash To Be Available

(By Pennsylvania News Service) Harrisburg — Federal civil defense funds in the amount of \$1,024,560 will be made available to

political subdivisions within Pennsylvania for the purchase of civil defense supplies and equipment during the coming fiscal year. Dr. Richard Gerstell, state civil defense director said this week. Full instructions outlining the processes to be employed in obtaining funds are contained in a

Federal Civil Defense Manual which is being sent to County Defense Directors throughout the state for distribution to local political subdivisions. "The only material so far furnished us," Gerstell commented, "are the manuals which are priced at \$1 per copy, and which we are furnishing gratis to our directors to enable them to anticipate their requirements at a time when budgetary programs are being drawn up."

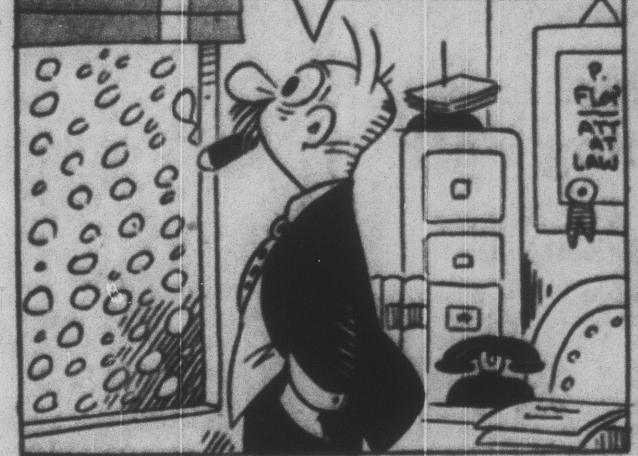
Deploing the delay and confusion that must necessarily follow the failure of the Federal Government to supply forms, Gerstell emphasized that the state could do nothing to facilitate procurement of funds until the forms had been properly accomplished.
