St. Francis College Certified To Prepare Grade Teachers

Courses May Be Offered In Evenings, Saturdays

St. Francis College of Loretto has been certified to prepare teachers for work in the elementary schools. Announcement of the college's approval was received by the State Council of Education, made by The Rev. Xavier Crowley, TOR, president of St. Francis. Notification of the school's approval was received from Carl E. Seifert, secretary of the State Council of Education.

Following receipt of the school's certification, the Loretto president said that the first courses may be offered this summer. "We have received many requests to install a curriculum for the preparation of elementary teachers," Fr. Crowley said. He continued, "A study of this problem shows that the need is great at present and will become greater in years to come. It is vitally necessary for the preservation of our American way of life to have these teachers well prepared. We are happy to cooperate in this way, and will put all our resources to work to accomplish this goal."

The Loretto president explained that a complete inspection of the college's plant and resources was made by the State Council of Education several weeks ago, and that approval of the college's extensive facilities was received with the announcement of the certification.
