## St. Francis Divides Almost Twin Tilts With Ft. Belvoir

Army Engineers Downed 80-75 On Saturday; GI's Trim Loretto 80-76 Sunday Afternoon

The Red Flames of St. Francis College, Loretto, closed their season by dividing a pair of rough-and-tumble exhibition contests with the Ft. Belvoir Army Engineers by almost identical scores over the week end.

Coach Skip Hughes' Flames lost, 80-76, in a regular shortstop in the Cambria County War Memorial Arena before 1,250 paid fans after trimming the Engineers, 80-75, in Altoona Jaffa Mosque Saturday night.

Dick Great, the All-American performer from Duke University, did not play in either game for Ft. Belvoir. The tri-state cage has been sidelined with a heavy cold. Great, a regular shortstop for the Flames before he was drafted, expressed his regrets to the crowd because he was unable to play.

Two players were ejected for fighting and three players were removed with five personals in a foul-infested contest Sunday afternoon in the arena.

The Flames fell behind by 14 points, 42-28, with two minutes to play in the first half. They rallied to cut the deficit to 45-35 at halftime. St. Francis used a 28-18 blitz in the third period to balance the scoreboard, 63-63, as the last quarter opened.

Bud Donnelly, of the Engineers and the Flames' Ed Dugan traded baskets in the first minute of the fourth period before Dugan and Fred Iles were ejected by Referee Frank Smith for trading elbows under the basket.

## St. Francis Tourney Games Are Proving Of Much Interest In Area

Hastings Cresson and BCI took first round victories in the 25th annual St. Francis College Varsity F Tournament at Doyle Hall in Loretto, as Patton and Barnesboro were out of the running in the tourney's B competition this week end.

In the opening of the tourney last Thursday evening the Red Dragons of Barnesboro lost out to Lilly, 50-40. The same evening the Cresson Indians clipped Black Lick Twp., 47-33.

Last Friday evening the Hawks of Hastings rolled to a 51-30 win over Patton, and BCI defeated Wilmore, 44-35.

Barnesboro loses to Lilly, 50-40. Lilly had to settle for a last minute 17-7 edge to safely defeat the Red Dragons of Barnesboro last Thursday in opening round of the tournament. The Raiders took the first round, 51-31, as the Dragons came back with a 9-7 edge in the second period to tie the game 20-20 at intermission. At the end of three quarters the score was still tied, 23-23 as both sides scored 12 points in that round. Then Lilly broke open and registered a 17-7 edge to take the win.

## Fish 'Paradise' To Open May 14

Fisherman's Paradise, the No. 1 state trout stream, will be open to Pennsylvania anglers for more than two months this summer.

The State Fish Commission last week fixed Friday, May 14, to Saturday, July 17, inclusive, except Sundays, as the dates for fishing at the protected location on Spring Creek, near Bellefonte, Centre County. The commission established these rules for the 1954 season at the Paradise only.

Legal hours for fishing will be from 6 a. m. to 8 p. m., standard time. Fishing is restricted to use of artificial lures of hair or feather construction with barbless hooks. Minimum size on the large stream is 10 inches and on the women's fishing stream, 7 inches.

Spoons, spinners or swivels are not allowed and wading in the stream for any purpose is prohibited.

Only one fish can be killed by each angler on any one day.

Regularly licensed Pennsylvanians may fish at the project five times during the season and must register personally going in and coming out.

No special fishing license is required. The Cambria County Archers go to it again this week end but this time the archers are competing in the big time.

## 4 Months Closed To Dog Training

Pennsylvania dog owners and trainers are reminded that except in defense of person or property they may not lawfully permit dogs that are their property or dogs they control to chase or train upon wild game between the first day of April, next Thursday, and the 31st day of July.

There is one exception to this provision. When the State Game Commission receives and approves a petition signed by 250 or more residents of a county, who held hunting licenses in the previous year or who are farmers or sheep raisers, whether licensed to hunt or not, foxes may be lawfully hunted in such county with dogs, day or night, throughout the entire year except for the 50-day period designated by the Commission. That closed period is April 1 to May 30, inclusive.

The two teams this year will be known as the East and West instead of the North and South, as in previous years.

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## German Ace Will Seek 35th Win On TV Tomorrow

New York (Special)—Al Andrews, fast rising young middleweight, will try to stop undefeated Gustav Scholz of Germany in a scheduled 10-round bout as the regular Friday, March 26, evening TV bout on the Gillette-Satety Razor Company's Cavalcade of Sports. The program at 10 p. m. will be seen locally on Channel 6, WJAC-TV, Johnstown.

Andrews won national recognition by his two upset victories over TV idol Chuck Davel, Al, 22 years old, started boxing while in the Army and gained the Fifth Army middleweight title. Since turning pro in July 1952, he has gained 27 victories in 31 starts. His fast-action style of boxing has given Al, in addition to the two over Davey, the nod over Pat Lowry, Lou Barry, Eddie Sims and Pat Mann.

Scholz will put his undefeated record of 34 pro bouts on the line in his first U. S. appearance. Gustav, same age as his opponent, made his pro start in 1948. One of the brightest European prospects for future championship contention, Scholz possesses a heavy prowess best indicated by his record of 17 knockouts in his 34 appearances. In Sept., of 1953, Gustav relinquished his German welterweight title to enter his present class and hasn't allowed any of his nine opponents since then to go the distance.
