

Northern Cambria Track Meet Scheduled Next Tuesday

Third Annual Event Slated At John Carroll High Stadium, Carrolltown

Spangler, Patton, John Carroll and Barnesboro To Vie For Honors; Hastings Outfits Team

The third annual Northern Cambria High School track and field meet will be held next Tuesday afternoon, April 20, at John Carroll High School Stadium in Carrolltown, it was announced by this newspaper today by the four area track coaches. The event is scheduled to get under way promptly at 2:30 p. m.

Plans for the quadrangular meet were made Monday evening of this week at a meeting of the area coaches in the Carrolltown American Legion Home. Schools to be represented in this year's event will be Spangler, defending champion, Patton, John Carroll and Barnesboro.

In announcing plans for the 1954 event, coaches also drew up a program of track and field events which are scheduled to be conducted simultaneously at the huge Carrolltown stadium. All running events are scheduled for the stadium's one-fifth mile track and the field events will be held on the stadium's practice field.

A full meet is planned again this year and all field and track events are scheduled with the exception of the hurdles. Competition in the field event will be in discus, shot put, high jump, broad jump and javelin. There will be no competition in the pole vault.

The fifth-mile track of the Carrolltown stadium, only track in the Northern Cambria area, will be used for the track events. Competitions will be held in the 100, 220, 440, half-mile or .800, mile run, 4 mile relay and mile relay.

All residents of Northern Cambria area are cordially invited to attend the meet. There will be no admission charge.

John B. Green, athletic director and track coach at John Carroll High School, the chairman of the event, said that everything will be in order for Tuesday's meet. Mr. Green said that a new pit has been completed for the high and broad jump in the field events, and if the weather is dry and recently calm, both the new and old pits can be used for these events. Mr. Green also said he has hopes of having the track rolled over to the meet at all points. Thus far he has been unable to obtain a large roller suitable for the work.

The chairman of the meet also reported that all schools participating in Tuesday's meet should send at least two or three adult coaches or teachers beside the regular track coaches, so that enough officials and timers can be on hand to help make the meet a fast and successful one. He also stressed the importance of on-lookers and fans to remain off the infield during the track events and behind all chains off lines during the field events, so that no accidents will occur. He said this should be particularly noted in the javelin, discus and shot put events.

All Are Invited: No Admission Mr. Green said that all residents of Northern Cambria area are invited to attend the meet. There will be no admission charge.

In order that statistics of the meet can be kept, it is hoped that an early check-in will be made Tuesday. Last year over 400 fans were present.

Spangler, defending champion of the North Cambria meet, took first place in three of the five field events and first spot in two of the six track events last season to grab in top honors with 69 1/2 points. Barnesboro paced second, John Carroll third, Patton third and Hastings fourth place. This will mark the second year in track competition for the franchise team.

Besides a number of returning members for all the area teams, it was also noted that there are still a number of up-and-coming youngsters who are now showing fine form and may even outshine the veterans in next week's meet. It promises to be a very interesting event. Plan to attend!

Four teams are entered in the 1954 league which has been in operation for the past several years. Teams entered are Hastings High, defending champions, Spangler High, the only two Northern Cambria clubs in the circuit, Harmony Joint High of Clearfield County and Lilly High School of the Mainline section of Cambria County. The Lilly team is replacing Barnesboro High which does not have a team this year.

Public Lands Open To Hunting

While the number of Pennsylvania hunters was doubling in the past 30 years, great areas of open small game territory were being closed to shooting. In some cases hunting is prohibited now in whole townships. Mainly, the housing developments, the building of highways and the expansion of industries caused the shrinkage of open land on which small game hunting could be enjoyed.

On the other hand, an up-to-date record shows well over 1,700,000 acres owned in the name of the State Game Commission, or leased by the agency, open to public hunting. This exclusive of swamps, safety zones, the game propagation areas, etc. Included in this total are huntable acres on FarmG game Projects and game land holdings. The latter are largely woodlands administered by the Game Commission. The total amount of Commission owned or leased areas aggregates over 2 million acres. About 1,500,000 acres of state land managed by the Department of Forests and Waters are also open hunting territory, as are nearly one-half million acres of the Allegheny National Forest.
