Barr Twp. School
Levies Are Raised

The Barr Township School
Board last Thursday adopted a
1954-55 tax program calling for
an increase of 12 mills in the real
estate tax.
The property tax rate was set
at 24 mills, the same as that of
1953-54. Directors explained that
the rate was slashed to 12 mills
a year ago because of a cash bal-
ance which had accumulated in
the treasury.
Directors voted to reenact a \$5
per capita tax.
The board also prepared a pre-
liminary 1954-55 budget, calling for
expenditures of \$160,216.22. Of
the total, \$78,070 will be used to
operate township elementary sch-
ools. The balance represents the
township's share in operation of
North-Cambria Joint Schools.
The budget will be open to pub-
lic inspection in the home of Ed-
gis Hamwell, Marsteller, secretary.
T. F. Dougherty was retained
as board treasurer. Next meeting
will be held July 6.
