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### Flemming to Head Unit to Study Soft Coal Difficulties

#### Mine Journal Hits Red Tape in Other Areas

President Eisenhower last Friday set up a six-member government committee to study the difficulties of the soft coal industry and recommend remedies.

The President named Mobilization Director Dr. Arthur S. Flemming to head the group, and gave it the job of determining "the extent of the danger to the strength and well-being of the nation created by present conditions" in the industry.

He told Dr. Flemming in a letter that although soft coal is essential to the nation's defense, its use and production have dropped in recent years to the point where

there is a danger of serious loss to the country's ability to produce coal.

Eisenhower stressed that the study group should recommend remedial steps.

To Serve on Committee

To serve with Dr. Flemming he designed Samuel C. Waugh, assistant secretary of state for economic affairs; Thomas P. Pike, assistant secretary of defense; Felix E. Wogner, assistant secretary of the interior; Lothair commerce, and Rocco C. Siciliano, assistant secretary of labor.

The White House did not announce how long the survey is expected to take.

UMW Hits Food Setup

The United Mine Workers (UMW) Journal meanwhile complained that distribution of federal surplus food to unemployed coal miners and their families has become bogged down in "government red tape" with many going hungry.

"Actual distribution in the local communities is burdened with red tape, costly overhead expenses

and a plague of federal gunshoe agents," the union newspaper said, adding that only minute quantities (of food) are made available to consumers.

"Reports from every coal region where such surplus food is being administered portray similar pictures of distress and suffering as federal and local officials pass the buck between themselves on petty details while the people suffer."

(In Cambria County, distribution of food surplus food is in charge of the UMWA locals.)

Says Miners Are Hungry

The paper said mine families are going hungry while \$6 billion worth of farm commodities are being stored at a storage cost of more than \$700,000 a day.

The union estimates that more than 100,000 out of the nearly 400,000 bituminous and anthracite coal miners are without jobs and those who are working are averaging less than three days of work a week.

Heaviest coal unemployment is in West Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Kentucky. The journal said

the number of individuals receiving surplus foods has risen from 10,000 last December to 140,000 in June in West Virginia alone.

### CULL FLOCKS OFTEN

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### Law Says You Must Write Bank to Stop Payment On Check

If you want to stop payment on a check you will have to write to the bank.

This is an important provision of the new Pennsylvania commercial code which went into effect July 1 designed to simplify business transactions. It governs all leading institutions in the state. The ruling on written requests for stop-payment checks will be in force at all banks in the Altoona area.

In the past a telephone call to the bank has been sufficient to stop payment of checks. Under the new law such a call will be binding on the bank "only until the customer has had a reasonable opportunity to send the bank a written confirmation."

Local bankers said today the new code is highly technical, but added: "Lawyers who have been studying the code for the past few months say it should prove beneficial."

The new code also provides: "The burden of establishing the fact and the amount of loss resulting from payment of an item contrary to a binding stop-payment order is on the customer."

In enacting the code, Pennsylvania became the first state to approve it under a plan to make the code law throughout the United States.

The American Law Institute and the National Conference of Commissioners of Uniform State Laws spent five years and more than \$400,000 to draft the model law.

The code will serve to eliminate a lot of "fine print" at the bottom of sales contracts. It also rules out "chattel mortgage" and "conditional sale."

The sales contract of the future will be known as a "secured transaction," which simply means an agreement to buy something on credit.
