Cresson Joint High School defeated Greater Gallitzin High, 18-0, last Thursday, Veterans Day, in the season's finale for both squads.

'Take' of Small Game Said to Be Better Recently

Pennsylvania State Game Commission last week end made its annual mid-season report on the 1954 small game season.

The report said that prior to last Thursday, Veterans Day, the weather continued to be a controlling factor. Rain and snow in the earlier days of the season curtailed the hunting pressure in most areas, and with the clear, cold fine weather experienced the past week, the take is better, affording sportsmen unusual success.

In many northern counties, and in the southwest, in the earlier part of the season, snow altered the behavior of small game considerably. Most species were in the numbers anticipated, grouse alone showing a decline. In most areas the hunting pressure was below normal, but the take of the prize wild turkeys has been extensive this season.

Waterfowl hunters in the northwest blame Hurricane Hazel for the reduced number of birds there. In the northeast and the southeast ducks were reported in better-than-usual numbers. Hunters are reminded that the 1954 season on woodcock, snipe and rails ended Nov. 9, and that for brant on Nov. 13.

Deer Hunters Need Not Get Lost In Woods

Simple Precautions May Prove Invaluable

If more persons who hunt bears or deer in the rugged sections of Pennsylvania would take a few simple precautions there would be fewer cases of lost hunters.

With the 1954 bear season now under way and the deer season coming very shortly, the State Game Commission, in cooperation with area sportsmen's organizations, have recommended the following seven precautions and common sense that will save discomfort, worry or even serious results for many a big game hunter:

- 1. Tell your family the area you will hunt, how long you will stay and where.
2. Learn to use a compass, and carry one at all times.
3. Get a map of the territory you plan to hunt. Study it to learn locations of roads, streams and other landmarks.
4. Fill your cigarette lighter with fluid, or carry a waterproof container of matches.
5. If lost, have belief in your map and compass. Follow a course in one direction.
6. If lost don't allow yourself to become panicky. Build a fire for warmth, then rest and conserve your energy.
7. If hunting from a car, know where you left it so that you are not still "lost" after being rescued.

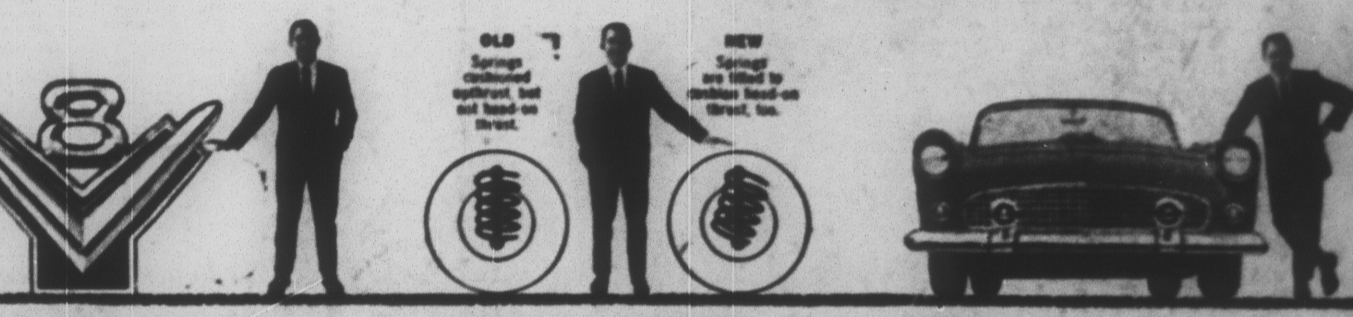
