Julia Yacos Explains Guidance Program To Local PTA Unit

Expect Teen Canteen To Open By Dec. 1

Patton-Chest Twp. PTA held its regular monthly meeting Tuesday evening at 8 p. m. in the Moose Hall and in accordance with the theme of the month, Guidance Service for Youth in the Community Schools, Miss Julia Yacos, introduced by Miss Mary Homyak, November program chairman, gave a very interesting talk on just what Child Guidance includes. She explained that guidance is not a subject but a service. The services rendered by guidance counselors are many—they help teenagers to understand themselves, to adjust themselves to situations, make their own decisions, choose careers best suited to their individual selves.

Guidance counselors check school schedules to see that proper subjects are taken—too often high school students find themselves taking the wrong courses merely because "they were talked into it" or perhaps their friends are taking it and not because they are suited to it. Too, when talking about careers, there are many things to consider. Should they attend a trade school, technical school, business school or college, liberal arts college, or will homemaker be their career.

The problem of financial aid comes up. Here again the guidance counselors help by obtaining information on scholarships available. Advice is also given on the different branches of service. Our young people today knowing that this is mandatory training need detailed information on what branch they would best qualify for. Miss Yacos touched on each of these points and all parents attending received her information with enthusiasm.

Mrs. Clair Gill, membership chairman, in giving her monthly report announced that a membership of 318 members had been received into the organization. This is more than a 10 percent increase over last year's membership.
