

### Individual Home Warning Devices For Attacks In Experimental Stage

#### Water, Electricity, Gas Lacking If Bombed

The government is planning a device that could sound an advance warning within each home in a target area in the event of an atomic of hydrogen bomb attack.

One such device, still in the experimental stage, could be installed in a bedroom and set off by a change in electric current if enemy bombers approached.

Civilian Defense Administrator Va Peterson discussed the idea in appealing before a House Appropriations Committee for a big increase in funds to prepare for mass evacuation of American cities in an emergency.

Peterson conceived the mass evacuation concept—under which millions of city dwellers in target areas would flee to the country side—presents "staggering problems."

But he said it is the only practical approach to the H-bomb threat, it is an "urgent necessity," and "we must have planned eva-

cuation or millions of Americans will die unnecessarily in the event of attack."

**Plans Must Be Drawn**

Peterson repeated predictions that within two years an elaborate detection system would be able to give target cities two to six hours advance warning of an enemy bomber attack. He said plans must be drawn carefully in each city and test evacuations must be staged to perfect the defense system.

His testimony was given behind closed doors last May and released last Thursday.

On the individual home warning device, Peterson said:

"We are hopeful that sometime in the future we might be able to give some type of alert through a device each family could have in its own home. Such devices are now under experiment."

"One is a little thing that one could put in his bedroom and a lowering of the cycle in the electrical circuit would cause an alarm to sound. Such device, probably, is quite a way off. Until we get that, our major reliance

must be on public sirens."

Peterson said one study "showed that we could have 22 million casualties, of which I think seven million would be dead."

A survey of one city with 1,240,000 people, identified only as city "X," shows that with advance warning but no evacuation, 631,000 persons would be killed or 51 percent. He said 211,000, or 17 percent, probably would be injured but would survive, and 32 percent would escape injury.

With an effort at evacuation, Peterson added, the same city could reduce deaths to 27 percent while the uninjured could be increased to 55 percent.

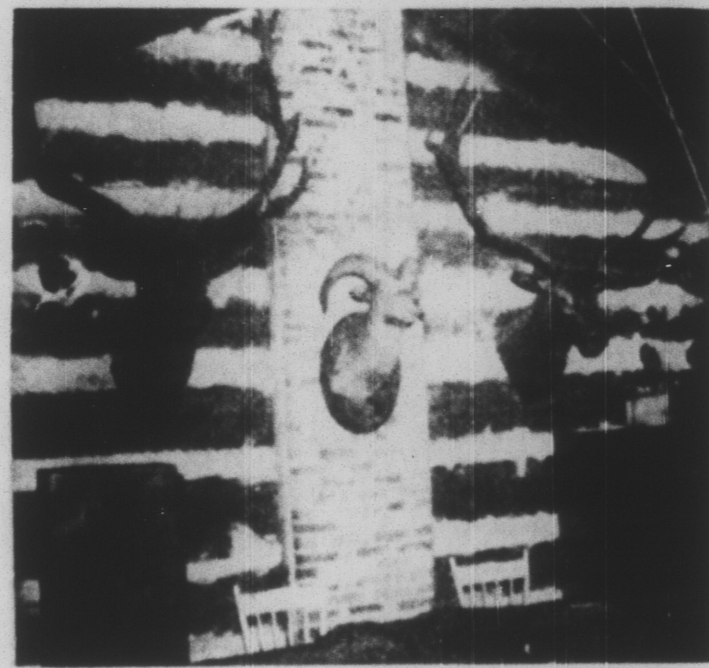
Peterson said plans for 6,000 emergency field hospitals to care for injured are planned. An idea he said the government is working toward a stockpile of medical supplies to care for five million persons for three weeks, at a total federal cost of 417 million dollars.

He said the government now has medical supplies to care for two million casualties for three weeks.

He conceded that shelter and food for the millions that might be evacuated would present a terrific problem, because there might be no city to return to.

"Life would become rudimentary the minute one of these rooms goes off," Peterson added. "Some of us will be eating bacon and side pork instead of bacon and artichokes and fancy things out of cans. We are not going to be flushing toilets in America and we will not be cooking with electricity or gas."
