New Years and Superstition Go Hand in Hand

Mankind has always been superstitious about New Year's. In older times families sought a glimpse into the future by the "dipping" custom. The head of the family, with his eyes closed, opened the family Bible and indicated a passage with his finger; the text, solemnly read and interpreted was indicative of the luck—good or bad—that was in store for them. Probably one of the most widespread superstitions concerned the first person to cross the threshold on New Year's morning. Women and light-haired men were considered unlucky, as were people who walked pigeon-toed. In some villages, the superstition was taken so seriously that a dark-haired man was hired to be the first to cross the threshold, thus preserving the good fortune of the community. Anglo-Saxons, believing that something might happen when the New Year occurred often climbed upon the roof on New Year's eve so as to have a good view of any such event. Mrs. Blair Stoltz Named Delegate For Rural Festival

Will Be in Pageant At State Farm Show

Selection of Mrs. Blair Stoltz of Ebensburg R. D. 1 as rural home delegate from Cambria County for the annual rural festival Tuesday night, Jan. 11, at the 1965 Pennsylvania Farm Show at Harrisburg, was announced by County Agent H. C. Terndrup. Mrs. Stoltz was selected for this role by the Cambria County Pomona Grange of which H. C. McWilliams of Ebensburg is Master. Each delegate is selected in recognition of her relationship to some circumstance in the improvement of agriculture and rural living in the county. Mrs. Stoltz is the daughter of W. D. Farabough of Carrolltown R. D. who is charter member of the Cambria County Pomona Grange. She, along with delegates named from all of the other counties in the state, will appear in an assembly that will portray rural home life. This, County Agent Terndrup explains, will be one of the important features in the big pageant. Title for the pageant or festival is "Song of a Century." The pageant will be part of the farm show's recognition of the Pennsylvania State University's 100th anniversary to which the whole show is being dedicated. Developed by W. R. Gordon, extension rural sociologist at Penn State, the pageant—a two hour program of entertainment—will portray some of the highlights of service by the University to the people of Pennsylvania throughout the first 100 years of its history. County Agent Terndrup and other members of the Agricultural and Home Economics Extension Staff in this county, all of them Penn State staff members, are assisting with the preparation of the big festival, January 11. Gordon will direct the pageant—his tenth at the Farm Show.

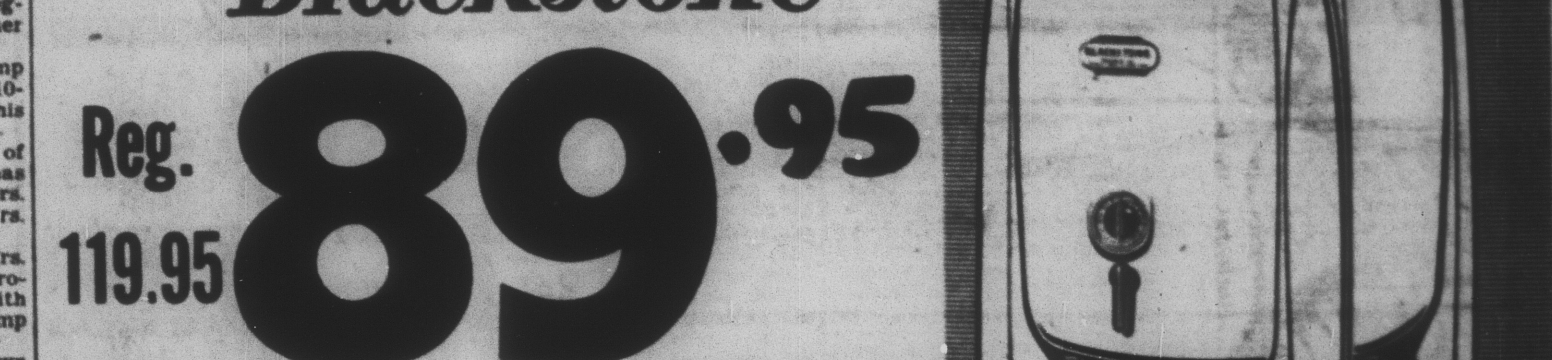
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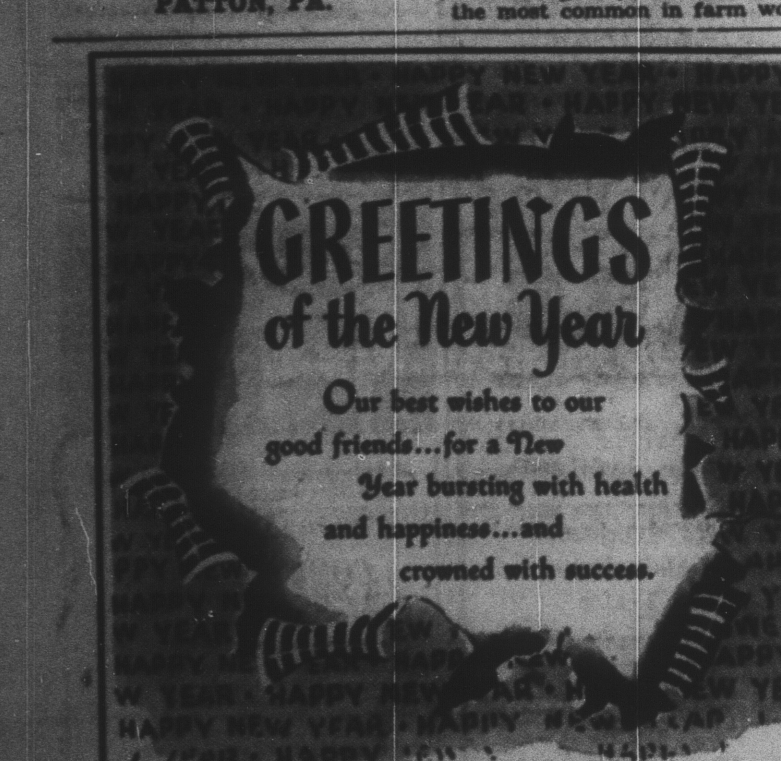
