Patton Panthers Trip Blacklick 57-39 on Tuesday

The Patton-Chest Twp. High School Panthers of Coach Charles Solomon bounced back into the win column Tuesday evening of this week when they scored an 18-point, 57-39, victory over Blacklick Township High school.

The game, which was in the Panthers favor right from the onset, was played at the Twin Rocks floor.

Coach Solomon used 10 players in the game as the Panthers racked up their fourth victory of the season against one defeat.

Patton led by a 15-9 edge in the first quarter. The winners took 9-0 edge in the second frame to go off the floor at the intermission with a 22-15 lead. But things only started to happen as Patton shot over to double the Blacklick count in the third frame to a 24-12 margin to hold a very comfortable 46-27 lead going into the final round. Blacklick, however, perked up a bit and man-

aged to take the final round by a 12-11 edge, but the Panthers were still in the lead as the final whistle sounded.

Two Patton players, brothers, Bill and Jim Schwab hit in the 18-point, 57-39, victory over Blacklick. Bill, a guard, sank 4 goals and 7 fouls for 15 points, high in the contest, and Jim, Panther center, hit for 4 goals and 5 fouls for 13 points despite the face guard protecting his fractured nose, an injury received in the Gallitzin contest on Tuesday of last week.

Leading Blacklick were Barish, forward, and McDermitt, center, who both scored 10 points each for their cause.

The Panthers hit for 18 field goals from the floor and showed a very remarkable percentage of 21 out of 27 foul attempts completed. Blacklick dumped in 11 goals from the floor and converted only 17 of 34 fouls.

In the junior varsity preliminary game the Patton Panther Cubs, also coached by Mr. Solomon, after leading throughout

most of the contest, were handed a very slim 43-42 setback by the Blacklick JV team. The Panther Cub record now stands at 3-2.

The Panthers will go into action again on Tuesday evening of next week here in Patton when they play host to Northern Cambria High School Colts in the first North Cambria Section B League game for both teams. Next Tuesday's program will get under way at PCHS gym at 7:00 p. m. when the JV teams play. The varsity contest will get under way at 8:00 p. m.
