

Area Patients Received More Blood In December Than Was Donated

Clearfield Branch R. C. Gives Financial Aid

Forty-five pints of blood were received by residents of the area covered by Clearfield Branch of Cambria County American Red Cross during the month of December, while only 25 pints were collected.

This is revealed in a report on the branch's activities released this week by George Radomsky, branch chairman.

The 25 pints were collected during a visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile to Ashville. The only other visit scheduled in the branch was to Blainburg, but this was cancelled due to too few a number of donors.

Blood received by patients from this area in Cambria, Clearfield and Blair County hospitals was as follows:

Patton, 29 pints; Hastings, St. Boniface and Flinton, four pints each; Ashville, two pints; and St. Lawrence and Dysart, one pint each.

The branch investigated two requests for extension of military leave, one in Patton and two in Hastings.

Financial assistance in the amount of \$45 was given to one Patton family, and two other confidential reports made on Patton cases. Counseling in personal and family problems was rendered in Dysart.

Memberships in the Junior Red Cross, together with amounts, were reported for the following schools:

Dysart school, \$5.05; Dry Run school, \$4.73; Weber School, \$1.60; Patton-Chest grade school, \$20.81; Brown school, \$5; Cooper school, \$70; Clark school, \$60; Moyer school, \$2.00; and Patton-Chest high school, \$8.36.

He also discussed a program of baseball activities ranging from youngsters to high school students.

Most Northern Cambria Weighing Devices Reported to Be Accurate

Total of 7,739 Scales, Packages, Containers Checked By Charles Cowan During Past Year

A total of 7,739 different measuring and weighing devices, and packages were checked in the past year by Charles Cowan of 14 Susquehanna Ave., Barnesboro, sealer of weights and measures for Northern Cambria County, according to a report made to the county commissioners this week.

In his report, Mr. Cowan also noted that one arrest had been made for selling coal without a weighmaster's license.

This being in Rodeo Township, with the parties pleading guilty and paying a \$100 fine.

Also noted was that some 50 bags of buckwheat flour in four and 10-pound bags and 120 bags of wheat flour were taken from store counters and returned to wholesalers because they were under the weight listed on the packages. Some 275 bags of Easter basket grass also were returned to wholesalers.

Other items tested included the following: Mine scales, 176, with six adjusted; truck scales, 82, with six adjusted; mine cars, 142, computing scales, 250, with nine adjusted; milk jars, 705, packages, 4,416; platform scales, 112, with three adjusted; avoirdupois weights, 326, with two underweight.

Oil pumps tested, 106, with two adjusted; spring balance scales, 46, with four adjusted; beam scales, 39; counter scales, 46, with three adjusted; measuring cups, three.

Liquid measures, 116; oil bottles, 98, with four destroyed; gas pumps, 272, with seven closed for adjustments, all corrected; hopper scales, five; scales naming exact weight, seven; egg graders, two; graduate glasses, two.
