

Patton-Chest Panthers Win 7th By Topping Lilly 67-50

Scoring 40 points together the Schwab brothers paced the Patton-Chest Twp. High Panthers to their seventh victory of the current season Tuesday evening of this week over Lilly-Washington High School, 67-50. A neat win indeed, the Panthers of Coach Charles Solomon showed better all-around play as they sent the visiting Red Raiders to their 7th loss in nine outings. At the foul line the Panthers made 22 percent of their shots on 21 conversions on 29 attempts. They also worked well from scrimmage as they made 23 field goals, four more than the Raider team of Head Coach Emil Salony. The visiting Raiders also did well on the field but not as good as the Panthers. They connected on 50 percent on 12 of 24 tries.

On the individual scoring roster it was the Schwab brothers once again. Bill the team captain and regular guard made 9 field goals and 6 of 6 foul shots for a high total of 24 points. Brother Jim, regular center, moved his big frame to 16 total points on 5 goals and 6 of 7 tries at the free-throw line. Also getting in the double figures for Patton was

lanky forward Ray Stoy with 5 goals and 2 of 4 fouls for 12 points. For the visiting Red Raiders three players hit in the double figures to pace their total points. Campagna made 3 goals and 8 of 13 fouls for 14 points as Sloan, a forward, and Madolsky each hit for 12 points.

The Panthers, who had nine players in action in the game, opened quickly with a 13-11 edge in the initial period. Then they virtually exploded on the offense as they hit for a 22-8 count in the second period to go off the floor at the intermission with a very commanding 35-19 lead. The Raiders stepped up their attack in the third period and came up with a 15-14 lead to cut the Panther lead to 47-34 at the three quarter mark. The Panthers came back fast and took the final round 18-16 to win by a 17-point margin.

The Panthers have suffered only one defeat thus far this season. The Patton Panther Cubs, also coached by Mr. Solomon, took their fifth victory of the season against two defeats by making it a clean sweep in the JV preliminary game. The Cubs won, 32-29, over Lilly JV squad. The JV game was really a thriller. With only 15 seconds left in the game the score was tied. Dick Gold pushed in a foul for a 30-29 edge and in the final second of play Mark Malkin hit for a goal to give the Cubs a 3-point victory edge. Malkin was high for the Cubs with 16 points and Madolsky paced the Little Raiders with 8 points.

Hastings Hawks Lose 52-41 Cage Tilt to Cresson Indians

Missing out on their shots from scrimmage, Hastings-Elder Twp. Coach Felix Catalano fell to their fifth defeat of the season against seven victories, Tuesday evening of this week when the Cresson JV High Indians took the measure, 52-41, in a game played at Doyle Hall, on the campus of St. Francis College, Loretto. The St. Francis floor this year serves as the home court for the Cresson team of Head Coach Buck Johnson.

The Hawks made only 15 of approximately 80 shots at the basket from scrimmage but they sank 11 of 20 foul shots for a 55 percent average in that department. The Indians, however, pushed in 23 field goals in the game and made a 50 percent rating in four shooting as they connected on 6 of 12 tries at the free-throw line.

The host Indian club jumped off quickly to a 14-9 count in the initial period and then added a 30-4 mark in the second period to hold a 24-15 lead at the intermission. The Hawks rallied somewhat in the third period with a 16-16 edge to cut the Indian lead to 38-31 at the three-quarter mark but Cresson came back in the fourth period with a 14-10 edge for the 11-point victory margin.

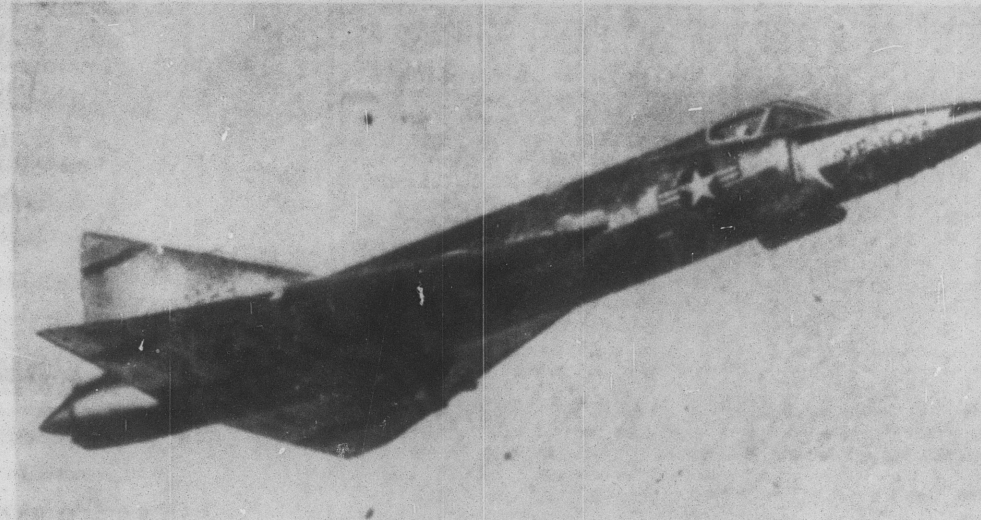

Fainting is due to a temporary deficiency of blood in the brain.

Not due as a rule to heart disease or any other disease of the circulatory system, fainting is temporarily a faulty working of the mechanism for blood distribution.

Fainting may occur in a perfectly normal person at a time of injury or when a person has received an emotional shock. During long standing, or even long sitting, much of the body's blood may gather in the abdominal and leg veins, drawing it away from the brain.

A hot environment can aggravate the situation by drawing blood to the skin as well.

Persons have fainted when suddenly jumping up after having been lying down for a long time.

While reclining, blood has become pooled in the abdominal veins and is not always immediately distributed.

Fainting is nature's way of getting the blood properly circulated back to the brain and heart.

For this reason, one who has fainted should be left lying flat, nothing else need be done to restore circulation to the brain. Loosening of a tight collar will take pressure off sensitive neck vessels.

Break the news to me gently, friend. I do not want to faint.

Help to Understand Sheet Labels Given

Sarna Black, extension home management specialist of the Pennsylvania State University, defines "type" as the combined number of crosswise and lengthwise threads in a square inch of the sheet.

A muslin "type 140" might have 68 threads crosswise and 72 lengthwise. A percale sheet "type 200" might have 104 threads lengthwise and 96 crosswise.


Farabaugh Elected

Gallitzin High School Gremlins had to use everything in their bag of tricks Tuesday evening of this week to edge past the improving Northern Cambria High Colts by a slim 2-point, 53-51, margin. Gallitzin went to his 8th victory of the season in 12 outings in the inter-section battle of the N. C. League. The game was played on the Colt home court at Barnesboro.

The loss was the fourth straight for the Colts of Head Coach Vic Chervenak after they took five consecutive wins at the onset of the current season.
