

Youth Found Dead In Auto In Sub-Zero Cold Thursday

Carbon Monoxide, Freezing Held Responsible; Companion In Critical Condition At Hospital

A twenty-year-old Clearfield County youth was found dead in his parked automobile with his teen-age date huddled half frozen at his side last Thursday morning near Cherry Tree. Victim was Allyn Snyder, Mahaffey R. D. 2.

His companion, Doris Ashurst, 17-year-old Cherry Tree R. D. 2 high school student, was in an extremely critical condition for several days at the Spangler Hospital. She appears to be slowly recovering.

The tragedy was discovered about 11 o'clock on Friday morning when the victim's brother, Walter, of Barnesboro R. D., found the car parked along the Cherry Tree and Westover road, about two miles north of Cherry Tree.

Dr. R. L. Williams, Clearfield County coroner, said Snyder died from carbon-monoxide poisoning, with exposure to sub-freezing temperatures as a contributory cause. The temperature on that night was reported in the vicinity of the tragedy at between 20 and 25 degrees below zero.

Coroner Williams listed the death as accidental and announced he plans no inquest. Considerable improvement is noted in Miss Ashurst's condition, and she was for a long period unconscious. Attending physicians said her pulse came just in time. In another hour she would also have been dead. According to physicians her blood pressure had dropped to 70

\$127,167 Recovered For County Vets, Report Discloses

Cambria County ex-servicemen last year recovered \$127,167.31, through Cambria County Department of Veterans Affairs.

The total represents the largest amount recovered by the office in its nine-year existence, according to the annual report of J. Harold Gibb, director.

Last year's total, an increase of \$23,886.17, over that of 1953, included:

Breakdown of Claims

\$45,249.20 from insurance claims, \$29,828.20 from applications for disability pensions, \$13,520 from educational allowances, \$9,206.40 from applications for death compensations and pensions, \$9,100.26 from applications for disability compensations, \$8,903.50 from applications for Pennsylvania Veterans' Commission assistance, and \$11,359.96 miscellaneous.

Only decrease reported was in the amount recovered on insurance applications, which was almost 50 percent lower than that of 1953. In 1953, the office recovered \$50,699.56.

Burial expenses were approved for 85 veterans of the Korean War, World War II, World War I, Spanish American War and the Philippine Insurrection. The office also approved erection of headstones on the graves of 127 veterans, six more than in 1953.

The office issued 244 markers, 11 more than the previous year, for graves of veterans of World War II, World War I, Spanish American War, Civil War, Mexican War, War of 1812, and Revolutionary War.

During the year the office received a total of 3,770 requests for 16 types of available service, and increase of 280 over the previous year.

A total of 127 ex-servicemen applied for education and training benefits during 1954. The office handled 83 applications in 1953.

Despite the increase in services the operating expenses of the office totaled \$23,255.17 as compared to \$25,998.61 for 1953.

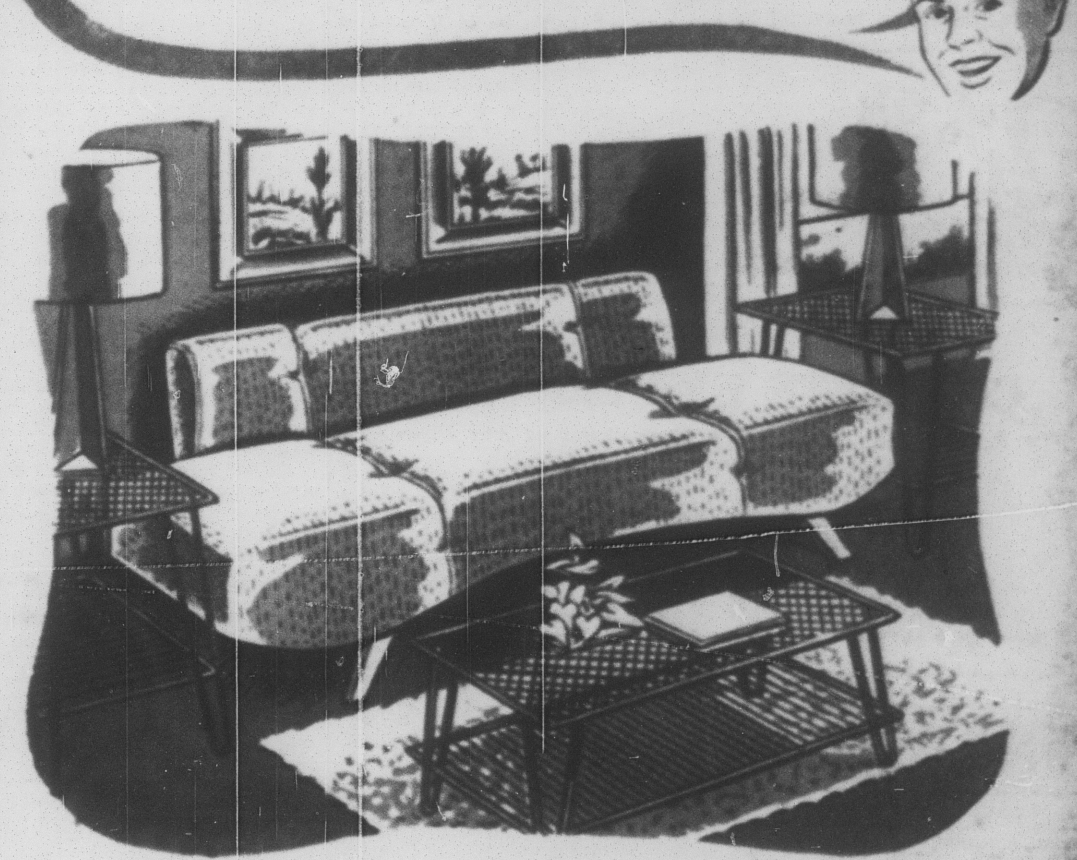

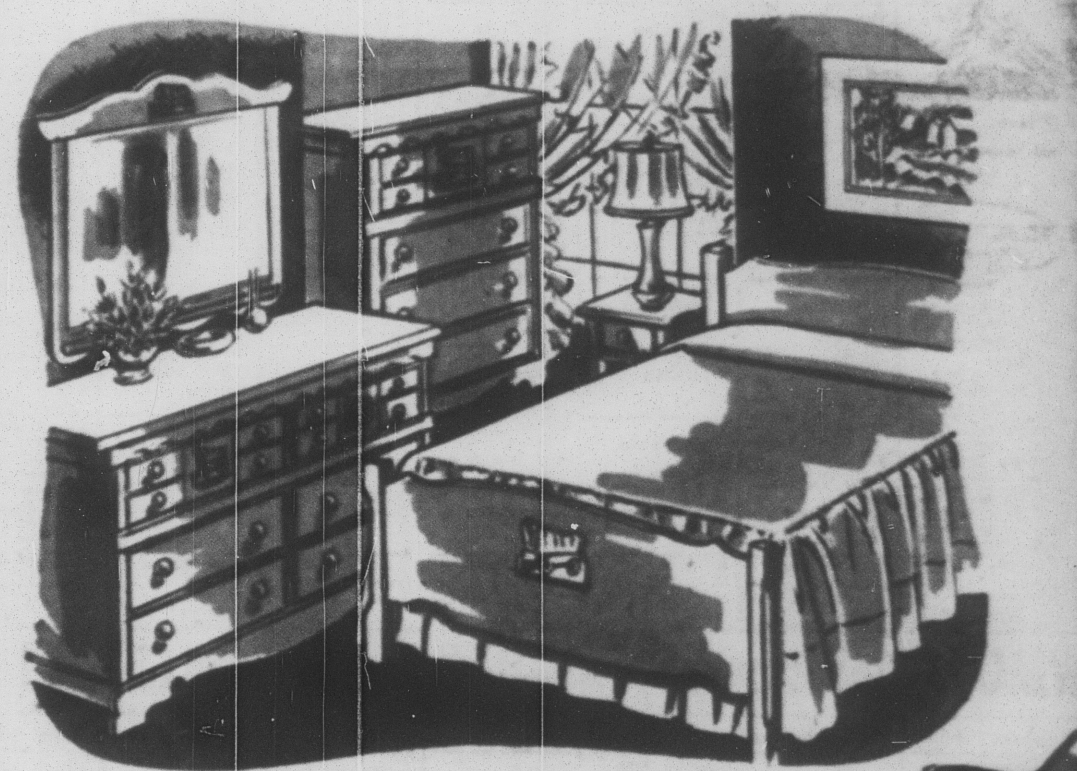
