Y.; and William and Theresa, both at home. There are 12 grandchildren.

Mrs. Kline was a sister of Mrs. Ann Beck and Mrs. Theresa Beck, both of Hastings; Lawrence Rodgers, Cleveland, Ohio; and Percy Akens, Nanty Gid. She was a member of St. Bernard's Rosary Confraternity.

Funeral services were conducted in St. Bernard's Church Wednesday morning with a solemn High Mass of Requiem at 10:00 o'clock. Burial was made in St. Boniface cemetery, St. Boniface.

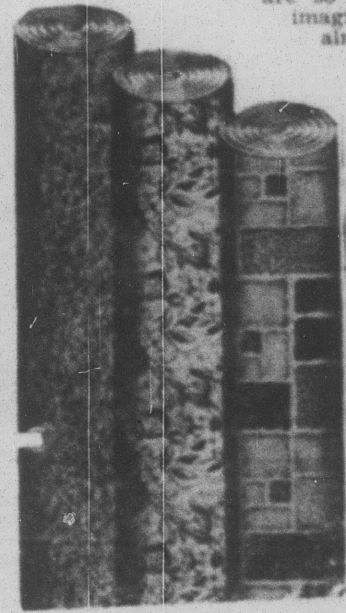

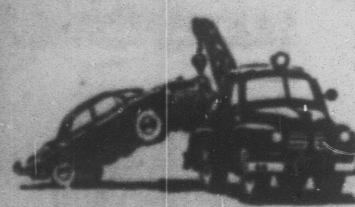
