

# Nelson, McDonald to Head Cambria Democratic Slate

## Endorsements Given At Meeting Of Party Leaders Friday Evening

The powerful Democratic organization last Friday night gave its blessing to a primary slate of 21 candidates drawn up by party leaders. In Johnstown the city ticket will be headed by Sheriff John A. Conway for Mayor, and Councilman Robert G. Hanman and Raymond E. McDermott for council.

The county ticket will be topped by Attorney Alton A. McDonald, Ebensburg, for judge of common pleas court; Judge A. A. (Jimmy) Nelson, Ebensburg, for reelection to orphans' court, and Attorney Arnold D. Smorto, Barnesboro, for district attorney.

After the slate of one name for each office was offered, David C. Wolfe, Johnstown, stood up and declared himself a candidate for district attorney, regardless of the outcome of the slating action.

Rising in his own behalf Smorto said he "had bowed out of the picture for the judgeship and in the interest of unity, and solidarity in the party."

On a standing vote, Smorto was declared the winner over Wolfe by 283 to 8. A motion to make the vote unanimous drew two recorded nays. Later Wolfe walked over to Smorto and told him that it would be a fight to the finish in the primary.

There were no other nominations from the floor and the slate as presented by party leaders for the city and county offices as presented by party leaders was adopted. The county slating candidates follow:

Judge of common pleas court—Attorney McDonald.  
Judge of orphans' court—Judge Nelson, incumbent.  
District Attorney—Attorney Smorto.

Treasurer—Joseph P. Roberts, Cresson, now deputy sheriff and formerly chief county detective.  
Recorder of Deeds—Dennis L. Westrick, Ebensburg, now county treasurer.

Commissioners—Pat Farrell, Johnstown, and Thomas A. Owens, Carrolltown, incumbents.  
Prothonotary—Joseph C. Dolan, Getstown, incumbent.  
Register of Wills—Michael J. Hartnett, incumbent.

Controller—Mr. William Lantzy, son of Mrs. Wilfred Lantzy and the late Wilfred Lantzy of Hastings, Saturday, February 19th.  
Clerk of Courts—Joseph C. West, Portage R. D., incumbent.

Ceremonies—Joseph Govekar, Franklin, incumbent.  
Harvey—Daniel J. Bradley, Ebensburg, incumbent.  
The county slate was read by Virgil F. Moraca, secretary of the county executive committee.

The committee consists of John E. Torquato, chairman; Florence M. Zalisnock, vice chairman; Madeline G. Buck; Susan Sheridan, Atty. Walter E. Criste, Hansrick Bender, John M. Casler, Lewis Evans, and Judges Ivan J. McKeenrick and A. A. Nelson.

As called for recently by Chairman Torquato, the convention wiped off the books a rule to support "sitting judges."

In rescinding the 10-year-old rule, the Democrats resolved that: "The Republican party in Cambria County and in the State of Pennsylvania has shown a lack of good faith and has constantly opposed all elected Democratic sitting judges by nominating and actively supporting Republican

candidates in opposition to Democratic elected and sitting judges, and has refused to accept either in principle or in fact, the endorsement of sitting judges for reelection."

At the close of the meeting, Torquato spoke briefly in defense of the Democratic plan of endorsing candidates at the primary.

"We can make mistakes in selecting judges," said a County Chairman, "but don't

you think over the years we have been pretty successful?" His statement was roundly applauded.

Then, referring to Attorney Wolfe's declaration for district attorney, he said Wolfe had been given consideration by the executive committee for endorsement as either judge or district attorney.

"It's no use voting here for a slate of candidates and then going home and voting another way," he told the delegates, adding, "I think everybody received a fair shake."

Both employment and coal production dropped in the 15th Bituminous District during 1954. Richard E. George, state mine inspector for the district, which includes Northeastern Cambria County, reported commercial mine output at a total of 1,045,260 tons—170,137 tons less than in 1953.

The district also embraces soft coal pits in Blair, Huntingdon, Fulton and Bedford Counties.

Accidents were at a low level during the year. No fatalities were recorded. Two mishaps each resulted in disability of 60 days or more. Minor accidents totaled 18.

In addition to the tonnage produced by the commercial mines, 93 small mines—each employing

fewer than five men—marketed 109,135 tons of coal.

All but five of the 15 players from both teams playing in the game scored in the double figures in the high scoring contest. From the floor the Panthers made 27 goals compared to 24 for the Wolves of Coach Dominic Alfieri. At the foul line Solomon's crew was hot converting 31 of 41 tries and for BCI they were off on the free-throws, making only 11 of 27 good.
