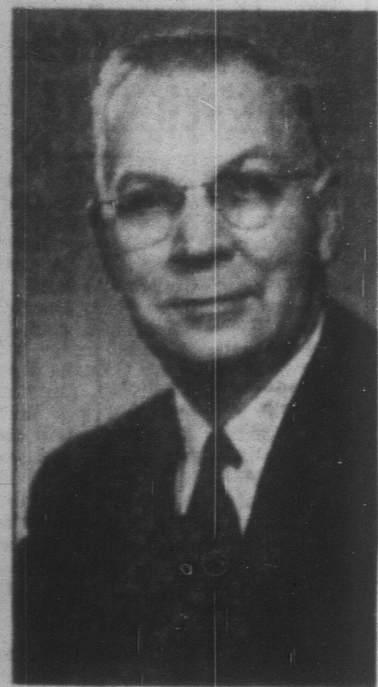

## Pvt. George McCoy Of Coalport Now Serving In Korea

Pfc. George C. McCoy, son of Mrs. Margaret McCoy of Coalport, is serving in the Medical Corps, 545 Gen. Disp., 25th Station Hospital, and is now located at the newly named 1st ROK Army Hospital in South Korea.

Formerly known as the 25th Station Hospital, the hospital is one of the largest operated by the U. S. Army in Korea. Its equipment and medicine is valued at more than \$100,000. It has not as yet been revealed what will happen to the 25th as a unit, but a spokesman said its doctors, nurses and enlisted technicians have been switched to other medical units throughout the Far East.

Operation of the hospital now under ROK Army control will be guided by the KMAC surgeon advisory group.

As Gen. E. J. McGaw, KComZ commander, relinquished the facilities he had a word of appreciation for the staff of the hospital who have worked closely in training many of the ROK personnel who will operate the institution.

The 25th personnel have conducted a two year training program for their ROK Army counterparts.

The young Coalporter entered the Service in Sept., 1953, and completed his basic training at Camp Pickett, Va. His advanced medical training was taken at Ft. Sam Houston, Tex. Prior to going to Japan in May of 1954, he was stationed at an Army hospital in state of Washington.

During a recent 15-day leave he had the opportunity of visiting Jay Lesher and Charles Bratton, both of Coalport.

McCoy was graduated from the BCI High School in 1952 and attended Lock Haven STC for one year, majoring in elementary education. His mother and sister, Jane, are anticipating his homecoming next November.

## 6 Lost-Time Mine Mishaps Reported In North Cambria

Patton Clay Again In Class C Winner

Six lost-time accidents occurred during February in mines affiliated with North Cambria Council, Joseph A. Holmes Safety Association.

The accident toll was revealed in a report presented at last Wednesday evening's meeting in St. Thomas Parish House, Barnesboro. Safety award winners for the month also were listed.

Council mines produced 167,159 tons of coal in February, working a total of 184,650 manhours. The accident-frequency rate was 32.47.

Safety award winners follow: Class A—Springfield Mine 4, of Springfield Coal Corp., which mined 14,670 tons of coal while working 19,469 manhours; Class B—Hastings Fuel Company Mine 1, 2,024 tons in 5,400 manhours; and Class C—Patton Mine 1, of Patton Clay Manufacturing Co., 1,514 tons, 3,223 manhours.

All three award winners were free of lost-time accidents during the month.

Program at the meeting was in charge of Pennsylvania Coal & Coke Mine 22 of Marsteller.

Featured "From Lead Ore to Metal," Springfield Mining Co., Westover, was accepted into the council.

The accident clinic report given by George Resick was on the subject of roof-fall accidents. A discussion followed on a ruling governing such accidents in mines.

Federal mine inspectors Joan A. Noon and Norman Rumburg will be in charge of the program at the April 20 meeting.

## Ex-Army Tutor PTA Speaker At Colver

Miss Marian Francis Ebensburg Public School teacher, addressed last Thursday night's meeting of the Parent-Teacher Association in the Colver School.

Miss Francis, former teacher at Colver, related her experiences as a teacher in a school for children of army personnel in France during 1953 and 1954.

## Patton DAV Gets National Citation For Topping Quota

Post Has Home Near Baker's Cross Roads

Patton Chapter 109 of Disabled American Veterans gained national recognition within DAV ranks this month by surpassing its membership enrollment of last year with a total of 20 members as of Mar. 1.

The local DAV has its post home at Baker's Cross Roads.

The achievement brought a special message to chapter officials from Judge Alfred L. English, national DAV commander.

"Your chapter is to be praised for this fine achievement," Judge English said. "Only through a strong membership can we achieve the goals we have found necessary for the successful rehabilitation of our war handicapped."

"I would like to take this opportunity to invite every veteran who is wounded or injured during war-time service or who is currently drawing disability compensation to join the DAV in order that the DAV might accomplish the single purpose for which it exists—service-of, by and for disabled veterans."

Generally speaking, veterans who have been wounded, gassed, injured or disabled while serving in the armed forces are eligible. In addition to World War I veterans this includes those who served in the armed forces at any time between Dec. 7, 1941, and the end of the Korean war.

John Guzzoni, president of District No. 2, United Mine Workers of America, Monday announced appointment of a new miners' commissioner for the district.

He is Owen F. Slagle of Kittanning, R. D. 3, who for the last 15 years has served as a member of the executive board of District 2. Mr. Slagle will maintain headquarters in the U. M. W. A. building at Ebensburg.

Mr. Slagle was appointed to succeed Lewis Evans of Ebensburg, recently named deputy secretary of the State Department of mines.

In his new capacity, Mr. Slagle will meet with W. R. Deringer, Hollidaysburg, commissioner for the Central Pennsylvania Coal Producers Association, to discuss labor problems in the mining industry. Mr. Deringer is a former resident of Spangler.
