

1796—TRIUMPH OF VACCINE—1955





THE TRIUMPH OVER POLIO by Dr. Jonas E. Salk can now be added to the long list of medical victories based on inmunology, discovered by Edward Jenner, British physician, musician and poet of the 18th century. Just as Dr. Salk, shown at bottom immunizing a youngster, injected his own children with the vaccine, so Jenner (in sculpture at top) in 1796 inoculated his eight-year-old son with cowpox, signaling the end of smallpox and the beginning of a new science. Financed by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Dr. Salk has one further step to go in his battle against the dread disease—to make his vaccine 100 percent effective. (Central Press)
