Hastings Rotary Told Salk Vaccine Aids Cancer Fund

The Salk vaccine, strangely enough, may prove to be one of the most effective weapons to date in the fight against cancer.

Hastings leaders in the American Cancer Society's current fund drive are attributing recent increases in contributions to the fact that the vaccine has provided an answer to polio.

"It has served to bring about an awareness among people that now cancer remains as the 'big killer'."

This trend of thought was summed up on Wednesday night of last week by George A. Clark, Hastings, who, with Clarence Tobin of Cresson, is heading the society's advance gifts drive in the county.

The Salk vaccine, Mr. Clark said, has erased polio from the front ranks of killer diseases. Now people appear to have their sights set on cancer as the next big killer to be eliminated.

This attitude is reflected in increased donations over last year. Some advanced gifts contributors in the county have increased their donations from five to ten fold.

Results of solicitations by the Hastings' 20 volunteer workers were cited as an example of increased donations on the community level. Walter Hunter, who is heading the cancer drive at Hastings, reported:

"Drive solicitors have collected to date a total of \$800 in advance gifts from this community of 1,800. Last year's donations totaled \$317 and in 1953, \$286."
