They must show that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively and that they are reliable citizens who would com-

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, ability and character. There is a one-year residence requirement and applicants must be at least 25 years of age and must not have passed their 63rd birth-

Complete information about the exam requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the Carrolitown Post Office. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C., and must be received or postmarked not later than May 31.
