Postmastership Applications Open For Carrolltown

May 31 Is Deadline For Candidates for Job

An examination for the position of postmaster at Carrolltown, a \$5,070-a-year job, will be open for receipt of applications until May 31, according to announcement by the Civil Service Commission.

The examination will be in the form of a written test to be taken at Altoona on a date as yet to be announced.

The commission is taking all possible steps through special publicity to encourage well qualified persons to apply for the examination.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy at Carrolltown must have at least two years' experience showing that they have the ability to conduct and manage the community's postal business efficiently and to supervise employees so that customers are satisfied with the service.

They must show that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively and that they are reliable citizens who would command the respect and confidence of the post office.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, ability and character. There is a one-year residence requirement and applicants must be at least 25 years of age and must not have passed their 63rd birthday.

Complete information about the exam requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the Carrolltown Post Office. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C., and must be received or postmarked not later than May 31.

Carrolltown Borough's two additional fire and emergency alarm "outposts" will soon be in operation. This was announced today by Thomas Buck and Lieb Farabaugh, co-chairman of the committee of Carrolltown Volunteer Fire Company who have been working on the project.

The two additional siren alarms to work in unison with the present signal atop the local Municipal Building, are located on top of a garage on the M. J. Farabaugh property on Church St., at the south end of the borough and on top of the storage building of Mohler Implement Store near Main and Mill streets in the north end of Carrolltown.

The two additional alarms have already been set up by firemen and according to officials will be ready to "go" as soon as Penetic connects the wiring and the Bell Telephone Company installs wires and relay switches. The new alarm system will be controlled at the main signal switch at the Municipal Building where the local fire equipment is housed.

New Fire Pumper Pledge Cards Now Being Distributed

Distribution of contribution cards for the purchase of the badly-needed new American LaFrance pumper for the Carrolltown Volunteer Fire Company, is expected to be completed this week in Carrolltown.

Every wage earner in the Carrolltown area will be asked to contribute at least \$4.00 over a period of four months under a unique pay-as-you-go plan adopted by the firemen.

The easy-payment plan will utilize a card with 16 quarter-size coin insert slots, which when filled will make a total of \$4.00 in quarters. The cards are now being distributed to homes.

Each slot has a date above it, with the first being May 7 and the final one Aug. 20. On the back is an envelope filled with seals for use in holding the 25-cent pieces in the slots. If you desire you may throw the seals away and put folding money in the envelope instead.

Officials stated that since the first of this year the Carrolltown Fire Club has been donating \$100 per month to the pumper fund. They will continue this until the pumper is purchased. To date the firemen near the \$1000 mark in a private drive started at the Fire Club last winter.

The need for a new pumper was pointed out last winter by a factory repairman who inspected the present 1940 model and declared that the pumping apparatus could not be depended upon. Temporary repairs have been made from time to time.

Firemen stated that they cannot hope to provide the best fire protection without obtaining new apparatus and expanded the help of the entire community will be needed. Fire insurance rates to a great extent depend on adequate fire protection.

The volunteers are trying to obtain a Civil Defense approval on a matching fund basis.
