

Archers Open New Range With Conference Shoot Event

Flood City Outfit Wins Cup At 25-Acre Site At Duman's

Host Club Wins 5 Medal Awards During Event, Which Was Largest in History of Conference

Rain squalls didn't dampen the spirits last Sunday afternoon, as 94 archers turned out to official open the new Cambria County Archers out-door range near Duman Lake, with a field round of the Allegheny Mountain Archery Conference. The shoot was one of the Conference's bi-monthly events.

The area archers new range of 25 acres of ground is built in a thickly wooded section on land leased from the Bearer Estate. The range is quite unique, as it has about one and a half miles of sawdust trails, where the archers walk from one target to another. It is probably the only out-door range constructed in this way. The range consists of 28 targets with enough land for 14 additional targets if need be.

Located near Duman Lake Park, people who visit the park site and the lake are invited to also visit the range and see the sport of archery as it really is. Cambria County Archers point out that this sport of archery is fast becoming one of the most popular in the United States. As the saying goes, it "the sport of man since time began."

The members of the club invite all archers and prospective archers to join their club and make use of their beautiful new range.

Five archery units in the tri-county area were represented at Sunday's event at the new 25-acre range adjacent to beautiful Duman Lake between Nicktown and Belsano.

Top prizes for Sunday's field round went to Flood City Archers of Johnstown. The Johnstown area archers took the number of medals to take the team cup. Twenty-nine members of that unit were represented at the shoot.

Other archery units at Sunday's shoot, besides Cambria County and Flood City clubs, were Broken Arrow Archers of Summerhill, Chief Logan Archers of Altoona and Penn Indian Archers of Indiana.

The host outfit won five medal awards at the shoot. Cambria County Archers taking medal awards were Junior Stopp, first in Class A free-style; Jack Kline, second in bowman free-style; Kathy Dumm, second in Lady Archer free-style; James Dumm, third in free style; archer and Tom Bender, first in Junior Class B free-style.

Don't get these outfits confused with North Cambria Pony League outfits. Official Pony League teams are those which are for boys 13 to 15 years of age, or the fellows who are one class below Little League and too young for N. C. Pony League.
