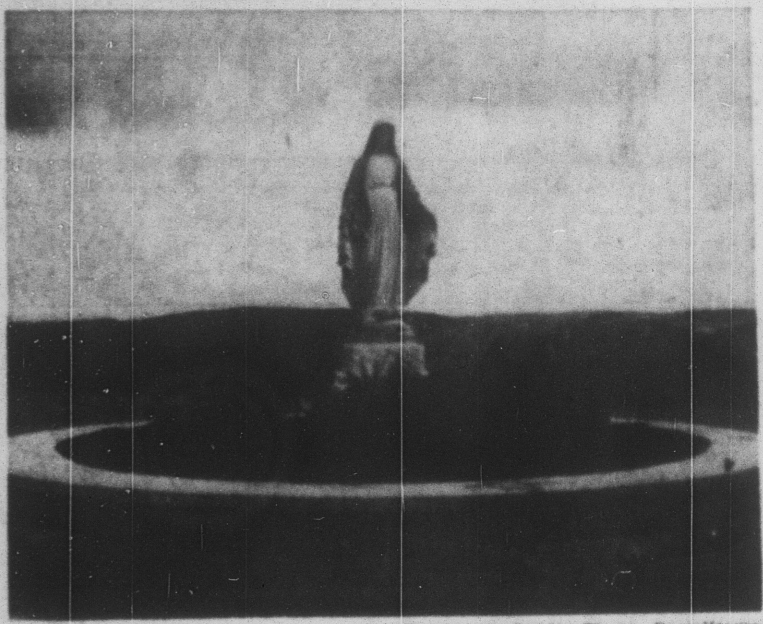

George M. Gates, Prominent Beaver Valley Man, Dead

Had Operated Store For Over 40 Years

George M. Gates, aged 75, a native of Beaver Valley, died at 10:10 p. m., Saturday, May 28, in the Altoona Hospital. He had been ill for several months and was unable to be about. Mr. Gates was admitted to the hospital on May 14th.

The deceased was born in Beaver Valley July 4, 1879, a son of the late Levi O. and Jane (Spangle) Gates, and had spent his entire lifetime here.

Mr. Gates and Katherine Krutz were married August 3, 1901, and they have resided in Beaver Valley their entire married life. The couple marked their 50th wedding anniversary in Beaver Valley in August of 1951. Mr. and Mrs. Gates were owners and operators of a grocery store in the community for over forty years.

Mr. Gates had been retired for the past eight years. Surviving are his wife and daughters, Tressa, wife of J. C. Semelberger, and Buelah, wife of Robert Barner, all of Beaver Valley, and a son, Calvin, Johnstown. There are 16 grandchildren, and ten great-grandchildren. Two brothers, Ralph and Edwin, also survive. The deceased was predeceased in death by a son, Rhudell, who died Dec. 24, 1938, also his parents, his aged father passing away in January of 1950. Also preceding him in death were four brothers and three sisters.

Mr. Gates, well known for his liking and knowledge of hunting and fishing, was always highly respected, and his death was deeply regretted by all who knew him. The Coalport IOOF lodge, No. 781, of which he was a member in good standing for 39 years performed their last service in a body for their departed brother on Monday evening, May 30 at 7:30 p. m. He was also a member of the Packers Fork Hunting Club, and Patton Sportsman's Association. He had served as a White Township School Director and Road Supervisor. He was the Forest Fire Warden of the area for a number of years.

It's the new kind of hardtop—The 4-Door Riviera!

There seems to be some confusion about what a hardtop really is, and we'd like to set the matter straight.

A hardtop is a car that looks like a Convertible with the top up—but has a solid steel roof overhead—and no center posts in the side window areas.
